'Ruby Bay road gets funds'

This modest headline, tucked away on page 3 of May 15th edition of the *Nelson Mail* heralded the successful culmination of the efforts of a great many people over more or less 40 years.

The concept of a "Coastal Highway" link between Richmond and Motueka was first mooted in 1968. At that time, what is now designated as State Highway 60, was quite a different roadway from what it is today. The portion of the road from Pea Viner Corner to Motueka was given State Highway status in 1970s. There are many who will remember the rather tenuous and in places unsealed coastal roadway which wound its way from the Redwood Creek Bridge to Tasman. Some may even recall the stretch from Tasman to Motueka prior to its updating.

In more recent years there have been two major upgrades: The stretch from the end of the Appleby straight to Maisey Road and the piece from Maisey Road to Trafalgar Road, the latter eliminating the notorious and lethal "Stringer Straight".

The Trafalgar Road to the Kina estuary stretch will complete the three stages with what has been rather euphemistically called "the Ruby Bay By-Pass". It bypasses a lot more territory than just Ruby Bay. At well over 10 kilometres it is in all respects a major highway project. When completed, the drive from Richmond to Motueka will be a different experience. Time savings seem to go hand in hand with our penchant for faster, quicker, easier. Savings on fuel consumption will be welcomed by those who make the trip daily or frequently. Those who live along the present route will welcome the drop in traffic for a variety of reasons—mostly relief from noise and vibration. The bottom line? Most of us are and will be pleased to see some of our petrol tax dollars in our face. Some won't be particularly pleased but will be resigned to the inevitable. Some will never be pleased. The price of what we call "progress".

What's next for the project? On 21 May Transit NZ began calling for tenders. With the "red hot" NZ economy

finally waking up to the fact that there is also a direction called "down", employment of resources (people, materials, machinery etc.) will have to be considered in a somewhat more realistic light. Roothing contractors will be tightening their belts and sharpening their pencils, but the tender process should take 12 weeks.

After the time for tenders has closed, Transit NZ has to rank each submitter in terms of qualifications to undertake and complete the project. Only after this ranking process can the tenders be opened.

We have to assume that Transit NZ and Opus Consultants have made a fairly accurate costing estimate as to how much the project will cost. And, that a bid from a qualified contractor or contractors falls within the Transit NZ/Opus estimate. At any rate, come August we will know, if and who. Then the "when" will more or less take care of itself.

This is a good time to mention the role that the Tasman District Council, and in particular our local Councillors Trevor Norris and Tim King, have played in their ongoing support for the by-pass project. As well, our member of parliament, Damien O'Connor, has been unstinting in his efforts in this direction. Also, Andrew Adams, Transit NZ Project Engineer, and Martin Crundwell, Project Manager for Opus Consultants, have not only performed their jobs to a very high standard, they have also spent personal time providing on-the-ground information to the general public. Now is an appropriate time for us to acknowledge their participation and support in bringing the by-pass project to where funding is approved.

This is also the time for me to say to all of you who have read my ramblings and diatribes, thank you for supporting the Ruby Bay project both publicly and privately and for your personal support. I will endeavour to keep you up to date as we approach the actual construction start date.

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

At the May meeting of the Mapua and Districts Community Association David Mitchell explained the background to the Mapua Inlet Restoration Strategy. He thanked the chair for encouraging presentation of the report and for the genuine interest he had shown.

The formation of the Mapua Causeway Committee had come about as a result of concern in 2002/03 that the new Leisure Park owner had wanted to purchase the causeway. A group of interested people walked around Mapua inlet, which was a voyage of discovery for many of them. Mr Mitchell asked if members were aware that the entrance of the stream to the estuary was littered with Maori sites as it was used as a launching place for boats into the estuary.

In 2004 the group produced a report that summed up the concern not just about the causeway but also about the whole area. The report presented an opportunity to do something about the whole estuary as well as improving access onto the Moreland Place reserve site.

Some sort of enhancement plan was supported by the Community Association at that time and the committee was invited to come up with suggestions. In 2005 Michael North was commissioned by the Tasman District Council to provide a report for the Mapua Causeway Committee with assistance from the Department of Conservation Biodiversity Fund. Mr Mitchell said the document was an opportunity for people to look at suggestions. It was agreed to bring up this issue at the next general meeting of the association. It was further suggested that David Stephenson might be able to attend to talk to the matter as well.

Waterfront

Elena Meredith said the waterfront sub-committee had written to TDC seeking clarification of issues in regard to the community's involvement with the park. The Minister for the Environment, Trevor Mallard, had also been written to in this regard. The reply from Mr Mallard seemed to suggest that control had been passed back to council and that they were in the process of appointing an independent site auditor. Furthermore, a reply had yet to be received from council in regard to the disparity between the E2 plan and the draft structure plan. The council had also been asked where in the

Draft Annual Plan was there funding for planning and development of the park and how much was set aside for this?

Cr Norris undertook to get a response from the council in that regard. He also confirmed there was no funding in the budget for building capital. Until the design work was done and a review made of the LTCCP plan, it was critical to get that aspect into the next ten year plan. It was acknowledged that the council would also be frustrated in having to wait for final audit.

It was moved and carried that the sub-committee follow up correspondence with the Ministry for the Environment, publish summary suggestions in the next *Coastal News*, and liaise with the TDC in regard to the appointment of a consultant.

A further issue in regard to the waterfront park would be the comments put forward in the Annual Plan submission. Members were asked for anything specific they wanted to see addressed as an action point. It was moved that the association support the funding for planning of the park in its submission to the Draft Annual Plan and for the council to ensure there was consultation and budget set aside in the upcoming LTCCP review under capital works.

Cr Norris emphasised that there was a motion carried in council minutes that the E2 plan would be used as the basis for the waterfront park planning. He emphasised that there had always been an agreement that 40% of the restored land would be open space for the community, and that car parking would be encompassed within that 40%.

Seawall & Esplanade

Bruno Lemke said that there was nothing to report other than if the council did not act quickly, Nature would take her course and if that happened, he was not sure if the community would be prepared to pay for it. Cr Brian Ensor noted that in the latest *Golden Bay Weekly* there was an excellent article on coastal work being undertaken. There was also budget in the Annual Plan for coastal care.

The next meeting of the association will be held on Monday 9th June at 7.30pm in the Mapua Hall.

Right of way contention

Eric Davy, Senior Sergeant, Highway Patrol indicated that the traffic turning right from State Highway 60 onto Aranui Road can expect to have right of way.

I wonder how long it will be before a major accident occurs at this intersection because of Mr Davy's statement. There is a sign on SH60 clearly stating that the right-turning traffic must give way. This sign is clearly visible as you approach the corner/intersection.

Mr Davy clearly did not assess the area before giving this information; if it were a member of the public that caused an accident solely following Mr Davy's statement, they would be penalised for not observing the Road Rules, signage and road conditions. However, would they be granted leniency because they were given incorrect advice?

Mr Davy said in the May Coastal News that a vehicle turning off SH60 onto Aranui Road had right of way over a vehicle coming off SH60 from Ruby Bay.

Mapua Hall Society

New furniture bought for hall

As hall users will be aware, the Mapua Hall Society Inc has taken delivery of 150 chairs complete with storage trolleys, as well as 20 tables as replacements for the existing old wooden furniture. These have been purchased with the generous financial support of the Tasman District Council (\$2000), the Mapua Business Association (\$1500), and the Canterbury Community Trust (\$12,000).

The Hall Society provided \$2000 from its own funds to give a total of \$17,500.

Members wish to express their grateful thanks for the support provided by these grants without which this project would have been impossible.

We have \$2508 remaining from the grants towards the purchase of the final 50 chairs and four trolleys, leaving a shortfall of \$2460. An application has been lodged with the Tasman District Council through the Annual Plan for a grant to cover this. We await their consideration.

The committee decided to dispose of the old chairs and these have been either sold or listed on Trade Me for sale. Some people thought that the old chairs were the property of the RSA and only on loan to the hall. The RSA has confirmed that the chairs were given to the Hall Society and we are free to dispose of them in any way we decide. A decision on the tables will be made at the next committee meeting.

At the Annual General Meeting of the Hall Society held on May 14, Judene Edgar presented her preliminary report on the recent district-wide survey in relation to the hall. Responses varied from "Do nothing because it suits us as it is" right through to "Demolish it completely and rebuild elsewhere".

The top ten priorities for improvement/renovation were:

- 1) Toilets
- 2) Kitchen
- 3) Storage/table trolleys/table storage
- 4) Heating
- 5) Change facilities/showers
- 6) Facilitate indoor sports
- 7) Paint
- 8) Cleanliness
- 9) Wheelchair accessibility
- 10) Noise/insulation

The committee will begin immediately to generate plans and a timeline to progress the points raised but it must be remembered that this will not be an easy or quick process.

As part of the fund-raising project which must follow the generation of plans and further public discussion, we need to have a history of the hall. A good history has been signalled as very useful in convincing funders that our project is worth their support.

We do have access to limited information that is easily accessible but we would like to hear from anyone who has information, documents or photos that they are willing to lend for copying and the preservation of those copies. Anyone willing to assist may contact me on 540-3642.

At the AGM the following were elected to the executive and committee:

Chairman: John Sharman; secretary: Mary Garner; treasurer: Peter Butchart; committee: Hanne Bjorklund, Glenys Forbes, Murray Garner, Jim Bryse, Bill Marris and Alan Mulligan. The position of deputy chair has to be filled, as do four more committee places.

Coastal Garden Group

Once again we welcomed our members and guests to a warm and lively meeting at the start of May. A letter of thanks has been received from the RSA for the help our members gave at the Anzac Day events in Mapua and Barry also passed on messages from the Settlers' Cottage Trust for the club's help in tidying up the garden there ready for winter. Business matters included preparation for our AGM and other upcoming events, ideas for future speakers and the club's first Spring Show.

Our speaker this month was Mary Duncan whose nursery in Hope will be familiar to many through her label, 'Vibrant Earth'. This large nursery supplies plants to garden centres throughout New Zealand and Mary arrived laden down with shrubs and plants to show us. Her enthusiasm for growing plants and exploring new varieties was obvious and we were inspired by the range of new varieties as well as some old favourites.

The climate here allows so many different plants to be grown it can be at times give gardeners a headache trying to decide what to buy. Mary discussed the plants she had brought with her and explained the conditions they needed and when they could be grown from cutting etc. She also explained that the size pot, 3-5 litre, gave the plant the best chance of successful transplantation and that the height/width noted on the labels are based on average growing conditions, soil type etc over a period of five years.

Our thanks to Mary for finding time in her busy life to share her joy of growing plants with us.

Max took up the question left from last month about pruning rhododendrons. It seems generally accepted that pruning hard will reduce flowering and may cause the shrub to go into shock. The recommendation is therefore to reduce the plant gradually over three years where major pruning was required but always to cut out dead wood. Max recommended clearing away dead leaves regularly as they can spread disease, which is particularly true around roses. Seek out frost cloth as the nights are getting colder and don't forget to feed the birds.

The colours of autumn were reflected in our competition table which included chrysanthemums, roses, delphiniums, petunias, a tree dahlia, the first of the early camellias and proteas. Time over afternoon tea for browsing our new sales table as well as catching up on news led into our plant auction which saw lively competition for some.

The one thing you can be sure of is change

Well, it's coming up three years since all the alterations to the building were done and the Mapua clinic opened in its new, improved format. Much has changed in the intervening period. As the days rush by its easy to forget how far we have come.

Three years ago we were still writing notes on cards, now we have a fully integrated computer system that links over the internet with our server at Motueka in real time. As we get to know our system better we are continually adding new features. Lately we have been playing around with a feature that lets us monitor and graph your pet's weight. So, if you are having trouble with your pet's weight you can bring them in for a weekly weigh-in and we can track their progress.

The surgery is fully operational and we have added some new toys, including a dental machine. The range of retail products in the shop continues to expand. One of the exciting new developments in nutrition has been the introduction of the joint diet for dogs with arthritis.

Of course there have been staff changes as well. Initially we had some of our younger veterinary nurses running the clinic. For the last 2 1/2 years we have had the benefit of Helen's experienced guiding hand. After 20 years with the clinic in Motueka it's fair to say that there's not much that Helen hasn't seen. Her extensive equine knowledge is also invaluable not only to clients that come in for advice but also to the vets! As I said, there's not much that Helen hasn't seen or many products that she hasn't trialled.

Last year we welcomed back Dr Chris McDonald, who helped to found the Mapua clinic and then took some time out from veterinary practice for a little R&R, if that's what you can call jumping out of a plane for a living. It has been good to have him back, in particular he adds to the practice's orthopaedic surgery and large animal skills.

Of course, I am still here, although trying to take it a little bit easy after all the hard work of the last three years. One of the things I love about Mapua is that even though I might only be working three days a week I tend to catch up with patients and their owners out and about in the village and people are great at letting me know how their pets are getting on.

This year we are working hard on continuity of care with our patients. Even though Chris and I share the veterinary work at the clinic we try to see our own patients as much as possible to follow through with their cases, much as your own doctor would try to do. So, you will notice that if we see your pet for a particular complaint and it needs to come back for a recheck we will book you in to see the same vet again. Also if you "bond" with a particular vet or prefer one vet's style over another's (just as with doctors) we will try to book you in with your preferred vet. We have just adjusted our hours as Chris is working one day less a week. Yet more change!

Recently visiting friends from the States brought me a little red jacket from one of my favourite shops as a “thank you” present for being their personal tour guide during their New Zealand holiday. The jacket’s style reminds me of Audrey Hepburn in Breakfast at Tiffany’s. Like many jackets it came with side pockets basted shut but the decorative stitching around the pockets made it difficult for me to tell which was which. I anxiously slipped my ‘stitch-ripper’ gadget along what I hoped was the correct seam and gently pulled the pockets open. Success! I had two serviceable pockets and a few red threads to discard.

Those threads got me thinking about life. Recent calamitous events in China and Myanmar and circumstances much closer to home reminded me that our lives truly ‘hang by a thread.’ Life is pretty tenuous and awfully precious. In an instant a phone call from the doctor or the police or an email from a family member or friend can turn what seemed like an ordinary day into a dismaying nightmare. Mapua School

This term has started with a bang, as always, with the students straight into learning and “Being All they Can” by trying their best, being effective thinkers and participating in every opportunity that is available to them.

This whole school participation was seen in the first week with the House Leaders (Year 8 students) organising our annual ‘Mad Hair Day’. Friday dawned with the majority of the students turning up at school with some very different and unusual hairstyles and colours. The staff participated fully as well, including a ‘worst hairstyle photo’ competition where the students had to guess the teacher from some of the best forgotten hairstyles from their past! There were three categories: most colourful, most bizarre and most hair gel used (the boys definitely liked the latter most), with the house leaders selecting a winner for each category from their house and then the whole school meeting and having a parade to show off their creativity.

Within the first two weeks the senior and middle syndicate have participated in authentic learning opportunities involved with science, which is our topic focus for the term across the school.

The middle syndicate was fortunate to have Constable Grant Heney in these three classes to discuss and show how the police fingerprint and how each fingerprint is unique. The middle syndicate is learning about forensic science and has a suspect that they have to identify through completing a series of experiments

The senior syndicate are looking at developing the students understanding of the scientific process through hands-on experimentation about temporary and permanent changes. They have a series of experiments to conduct at school and were fortunate enough to visit Waimea College and have a college science teacher facilitate a series of experiments with them in a science laboratory – boy, did they come back buzzing!

The junior syndicate are focusing on ‘water, water everywhere’ and have an inquiry-based unit that has experiments the students work through to develop their understanding of key science concepts linked with water. The juniors have been really excited by the experiments so far and have been asking some great questions to develop their understanding further.

With many new families moving into the area, the comment that is always made is how friendly, welcoming and respectful the students in the school are and we saw students being rewarded for this sense of pride and respect for the school and their learning this week in our school assembly hosted by Room 9. Well

done, Room 9 and all the students who received awards, you are definitely “Being All You Can”.

With the students showing respect towards themselves, each other and the school property it is a shame that we have had a series of young people, not from Mapua School, coming into the property and vandalising aspects of the school. This causes the whole school stress, wastes money and human resources on the clean-up and replacement and disadvantages the school. We have allowed people to use the school grounds outside of school hours, but expect them to treat it with respect and if they use resources to make sure they leave them in the excellent working order they found them in. We do not wish to ban people from the school grounds, but cannot sustain these acts of vandalism and will start to serve trespass notices on vandals if they cannot treat the school and property with respect. We ask the wider Mapua Community to assist us with this and if you see people acting in an irresponsible manner in the school please contact the appropriate authorities.

Next month we will report on the results of those sporting events and what the syndicates are learning through their innovative classroom programmes supplied by their hard-working teachers.

We need your help. From time to time we have patients who for one reason or another have difficulty getting to their appointments at the Mapua Health Centre or hospital. We would like to reinstate our Volunteer Driver Service. If you can help by either volunteering your services or donating money towards the cost of petrol, please leave your name and contact details with our receptionists or email your details to sue@mapuahealth.com

We have an increasing number of patients requesting prescriptions (including repeats) by telephone and email. The system is generally working really well for everyone concerned but unfortunately we have noticed a huge increase in overdue prescription charges. To help overcome this trend and cover our ongoing administration costs we will now charge an administration fee of \$10 on any accounts (for prescriptions) not paid within five working days. If you would like to pay your account by internet banking please contact one of our receptionists and they will be able to let you know the details.

We would also like to thank Bob Chignell for his munificent ability to provide fresh flowers throughout the year – these are most appreciated.

In case you are still wanting to make use of the flu vaccine, it is still available for free to those over 65 years or if you have a chronic medical condition such as asthma requiring regular medication, heart disease, diabetes, etc. Also, for those with ongoing mobility problems, wheelchairs are available for loan from the RSA.

Waterfront Park Subcommittee

The Draft Mapua Structure Plan proposed by TDC (see picture) and currently being developed, shows commercial, open space and residential areas on the remediated site.

The Waterfront Park proposed on part of the site is one of four recreational spaces in Mapua: Aranui Park, the Domain, Grossis Point and the Waterfront Park. The feedback includes too many proposals for the Waterfront Park alone. These other sites may be suitable for some of the ideas.

In this summary of Community feedback the order of suggestions is by chance. It does not imply any ranking of importance.

General suggestions

The whole chemical site area to be considered in this consultation, not only the east side of Tahī St. To achieve the many good suggestions from the community, the space on the East side of Tahī St is not likely to be sufficient. **WARNING!** The Draft Mapua Structure Plan has already included specific areas for different uses, which may lock in land use that is contrary to the community's interests.

The development of the waterfront park and the rest of the chemical site should not be seen in isolation from other parts of Mapua, e.g. reserve areas like Grossi Point, the Domain, Aranui Park, etc.

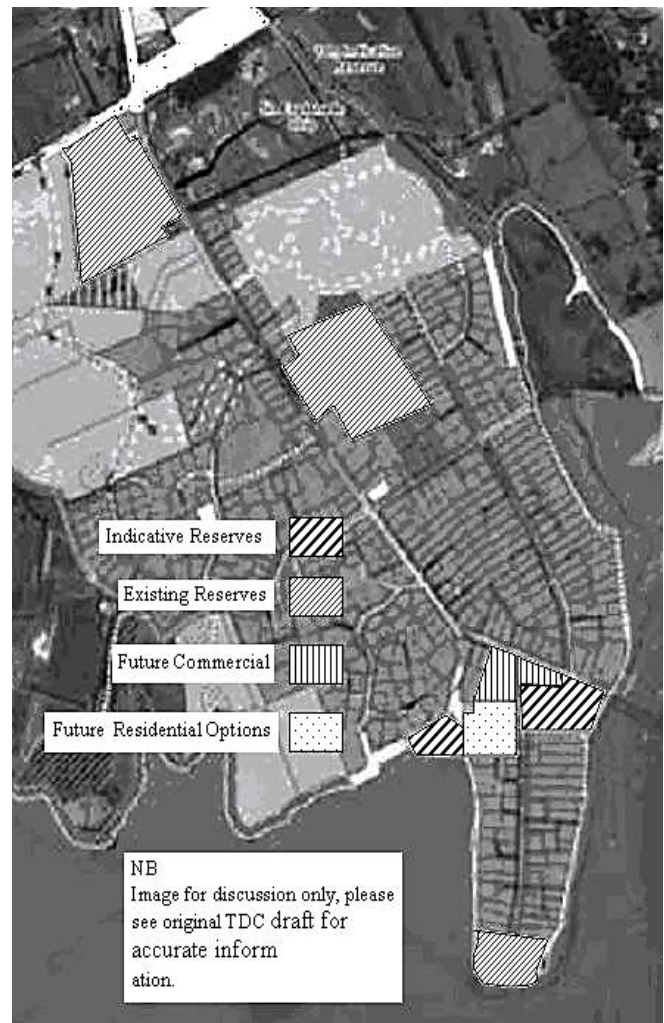
Any land on this site that will be used for residential or commercial purposes should be leasehold, so that TDC retains control over detailed use; maintain and strengthen the recreational character of this land.

As the development of the area may take a long time, temporary planting of suitable trees and scrubs, as well as grass seeding should be carried out to improve the look of the area. Natural ecological systems of this area then need to be considered to make the planting sustainable.

A consultation with local iwi needs to be carried out, in order to identify any significant issues of Maori history relating to this land.

Make all buildings (commercial, residential and public) on the site "carbon-neutral" with modern sustainable technologies. This may make this into a place to visit to see in practice how carbon neutrality can be achieved. Collaboration with university groups may provide part funding for the installation of the technologies.

Create a future vision for Mapua and a new logo (sea connection, tourism, horticulture). "Village by the



sea" ... is it the right slogan? Maybe "Formerly the country's worst polluted site"?

Specific suggestions for physical design.

Conserve coastal margins, gentle edges and water-edge promenade .

Car parking off the park. This may require part of the West side of Tahī St by Aranui Rd, which may be a suitable place for additional parking, a bus turn-around, and the link between a relocated Tahī St and Aranui Rd.

Bus turning place in the vicinity of park and wharf area.

Relocate Tahī St towards the west. This would also open opportunities to make a better proper park and walking link between the East and West waters edge of the chemical site. It would also enable any commercial activities to be next to the actual park, so

that users do not have to cross Tahi St to get to those activities.

Close Iwa St at Fire Station to avoid through traffic

No buildings being higher than 2 stories, and the design to fit in with other buildings in the area.

Seating and fountains; night lighting; water fountains for drinking; picnic area, herb garden, community fruit trees; many trees; much grass; boulders, drift-wood.

Amphitheatre with sound shell.

Interactive playground for children with nautical theme; maze; slides; concrete table tennis tables This may be considered in the context of the existing playground facilities at the domain (the distance is only 500 m). Maybe some of these suggestions could be implemented there and a smaller playground created in the waterfront park.

Small scale amusement park.

Toilets and changing rooms.

Information boards about wildlife, history, etc. Could be linked to existing museum facility on wharf, and information boards in other parts of Mapua, to encourage walking.

Salt water pool (as in Motueka)

BBQs. This may be considered in the context of developments at Grossi point. It is less windy there in summer and maybe more suitable for BBQs.

Boat ramp (and close boat ramp at wharf); relocate current boat ramp at wharf. This suggestion may be achieved by implementing another suggestion to expand boat ramp at Grossis point. Maybe a new boat ramp there facing the main channel (East side)

could serve the same purpose. Another suggestion was “don’t change Grossi point”.

Extend wharf (at least with a board walk) to connect with the park.

Fishing pier. Retirement housing.

Motel in commercial area. Some suggestions supported this and some were against it. Maybe a motel in the Leisure Park would be more logical.

Specific suggestions for physical design in other parts of Mapua

Walkways linking the park to other parts of Mapua. Waters edge promenade; board walk.

Bridge to Rabbit Island; grow molluscs on bridge supports, and water turbines under bridge for electricity generation.

Marina.

Bicycle-ways and walkways around village.

More shops along Aranui Rd on the way to wharf, not in “Mall area”.

No extension of supermarket at Aranui Rd.

Integrate new and old commercial areas.

Streetscaping (info from Heidi?).

Safe, swimmable beach close to park; put in golden sand.

Specific suggestions for activities in the park:

Bicycle hire. Art exhibitions and permanent art features.

Music performances. Other performances. Tai chi outdoors. Chess outdoors.

No dogs! Another suggestion was “dog friendly”.

Featured Product: Skype

You can make free calls to any other computer that also has Skype. You can also make very cheap (but not entirely free) phone calls to anywhere in the world. For example, it's just \$0.034 per minute to call a phone in the UK or the US or Australia! However, to make Skype calls you need Skype credit and this is bought by credit card over the internet which might put some people off.

Benefits: Skype is jam-packed with great features to help you stay in touch with friends, family and co-workers, share your thoughts and find the information you need. For example, you can instant message with anyone on your contact list or even use group chat to chat with up to a hundred people. You could hold a conference call with up to nine other people to organise a get-together and then use SkypeFind™ to search for the perfect venue to hold it.

take photos of yourself to personalise Skype. If you go to the Skype website www.skype.com, the phrases above that are underlined are hyperlinks to pages giving more information.

Domain Committee report

We met with the council in the first week of May to present the findings from our survey and to clarify funding propositions for this annual plan.

We expressed our full support for the proposed allocated funding. That is, \$15,000 for soccer lights, \$30,000 for toilet upgrade and \$21,000 for general upgrade.

In the meeting we discussed the use of the \$21,000. During our consultation with the community it was clear that people in Mapua thought that cricket nets would be a good addition to the domain. We talked of this possibility in our meeting with the council staff and Cr Brian Ensor and we are delighted that all agree that this would be a good use of this money.

We also discussed the use of any money left over from the \$21,000. Another priority that the residents of Mapua indicated was shifting the dirt BMX mounds further toward the tennis club. The council staff indicated that it would cost something to put in proper drainage and to move dirt to this location. We asked for the remainder of the cricket money to be used for this purpose. We have also asked for more funds to complete this task if the remainder of the cricket net money is not enough.

We are also very pleased the council will go ahead with bollards, a path around the eastern edge of the domain and an entrance for people in wheelchairs, planting across the back section, some seating (ie by the relocated BMX track), and a vandal-proof water fountain.

Other issues we discussed and will need to consider in the future were:

- The need to consider playground equipment. (Council staff indicated this will be looked at the next annual plan stage).
- Car-parking
- Drainage and irrigation
- Extending the skatepark

We briefly discussed timelines and it sounds like these things (other than the issues to consider in the future) can be achieved within the next 6- 9 months. Fantastic! We look forward to talking with you more in the future.

The guest speaker at our May meeting was Maxine Cook. Her talk was about her earlier life, and her present involvement in lobbying the Government to fully subsidise the cancer drug Herceptin.

Some years ago Maxine went to a quiz night in Richmond to raise money for a woman with a virulent form of breast cancer. The funds were to cover the full cost of treatment using Herceptin. It was some three years later, after her return from an extensive motorcycle tour of America, that Maxine felt a strong need to lobby the Government. She set about organising the Herceptin Peaceful Protest Ride that took place about two months ago. The ride took six months to plan and involved 12 motorcyclists setting off from Wellington. They toured the North Island picking up signatures on a petition that was to be presented to Parliament a week later. The petition formally asked the Government to change its money-driven stance to fully fund Herceptin

The protest ride got good press coverage, getting great support from breast cancer survivors and many motorcyclists. Maxine was able to negotiate good discounts for fuel and motel accommodation. A practical timetable had to be organized for the bike riders to attend press conferences, and lunches for the protest riders. All the riders had to raise \$1000 in sponsorship to cover their week's expenses.

The protest ride was a great success with 40 noisy motorcyclists arriving as a group at Parliament. The bikes were dressed up with pink ribbons and bras. The petition was accepted by National MP Dr. Jackie Blue, who is the sponsor and a breast cancer specialist.

The Herceptin Fighting Heroines said it was the most powerful protest yet. As a result of the protest the Government drug agency Pharmac has now been directed by the courts to review its original decision of not funding the full course of the Herceptin treatment.

Maxine's next event is planning a tour of the South Island with another partition if Pharmac continues with its policy of not refunding the full course of treatment.

After a good afternoon tea, club member Pat Sinclair of Motueka gave an interesting talk on her earlier life experiences. Pat was part of a family of five children, four girls and one boy. Pat's father died at the age of 32. It was about that time she started school. Her strict Scottish grandmother had the job of taking her to school. After the death of her grandmother, Pat's mother was able to her get a job managing horses. About that time the family moved into a large spacious house close to the New Plymouth cemetery. Here she spent some of her leisure time around the well-presented gardens.

Pat moved on to the New Plymouth High School. The school had some boarding students, and she given jobs in the school kitchen cooking the boarders' meals. Pat enjoyed her high school experiences, especially the sporting opportunities. Reluctantly she left school at the age of 17, about the time of World War Two, and learnt the skills of tailoring. A year or so later, through a friend, she moved to Motueka having a job picking hops on the farm of Keith Holyoake. Pat enjoyed dancing, spending many evenings dancing at the Brooklands Hall. There she met her husband to be. After several years in Motueka they moved over the hill to Takaka, but soon returned, preferring life in Motueka. Pat's husband was a keen gardener and having the use of two glass houses he was able to grow a good variety of tomatoes. The surplus crop was often traded off at the local RSA.

The Trust was established as an entity on April 16 2004 and a Deed of Trust formally signed on 28 April 2005. The Trust was incorporated under the Charitable Trusts Act on 5 May 2005.

The *Coastal News* made donations to the Trust during this financial year of \$7900

1. No personal donations were received.
2. No donations from businesses were received.
3. Grants totalling \$1675.00 were made by the Trust to: Kids & Koffee (\$200), Mapua Show Inc. (\$300), Mapua Soccer Club (\$300), Tamaha Sea Scouts (\$350), Moutere Hills RSA (\$125) and the Coastal Garden Group (\$400).
4. All of the Trust's financial assets are held in linked "Now" and "Online Call" accounts at Kiwibank. The "Online Call" account earns in excess of 8% per annum calculated on a daily basis. Account

operations can only be conducted through the "Now" account following internet transfer of money between the two accounts. Any movement of Trust funds out of the account is subject to prior approval and recorded at a Trustees' meeting.

International Singing Artist coming to Westdale

International singing artist Dave Stringer is coming to the Nelson region on his international tour. It will be a unique musical experience for this area as Stringer has been widely profiled as one of the most innovative artists of the new American Kirtan in publications as diverse as *Time*, *Billboard* and *Yoga Journal*.

“Dave Stringer has integrated his interest in Kirtan, an Indian tradition of devotional chanting, with his masterful grasp of Western popular music, creating an exciting style of psychedelic pop as informed by traditional Eastern music as the Beatles,” says the *All Music Guide*.

Initially trained as a visual artist, filmmaker and jazz musician, Stringer had his formative experiences with chanting when film editing work brought him to the Siddha Yoga Ashram in Ganeshpuri, India, in 1990.

Since 2000, Stringer and a diverse ensemble of accompanying musicians have toured North America and Europe, expanding the audience for Kirtan. This year Stringer has his first tour to Australia/Bali and New Zealand.

Based in Los Angeles, Stringer has produced varied recordings with other celebrated World musicians such as Azam Ali, Vas, Axiom of Choice, and Rasa. His voice also appears on numerous soundtracks, including the film *Matrix Revolutions* and the video game *Myst*. The CDs he has produced under his own name, “Brink”, “Japa”, “Mala” and “Divas & Devas”, are heard in yoga studios throughout the world.

So get out there and kick, yell, clap and enjoy what is the Beautiful Game.

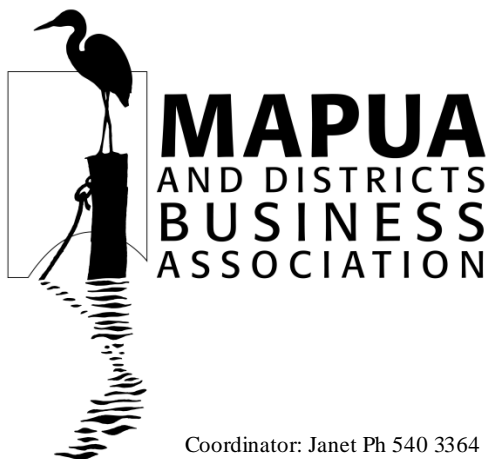
