

Māpua Waterfront Park - another viewpoint

The Māpua Pétanque Group has been the only regular fixtured sports group using the Māpua Waterfront Park twice weekly since 2015. The group has followed the proposals for the park over the years although it has never been consulted by the Māpua Boat Club about the proposed boat ramp or other changes to the park.

It was therefore interesting to read in your June issue the Māpua Boat Ramp Community Trust (MBRCT) announcing they have submitted a resource consent application for a large concrete boat ramp, new community buildings for Tamaha Sea Scouts and other community groups, plus other new facilities.

It was always understood that The Māpua Waterfront Park (40% of the remediated land) was gifted to the Community/residents of Māpua by the NZ Government in recognition of the harm caused to Māpua by the former chemical works on that site.

From the site plan attached to the RMA application the development looks to be absorbing more than 50% of the available public space in the park.

Are most residents OK with that?

It is unclear what legal interest the MBRCT has or is going to have in the Waterfront Park that will enable it to carry out the development outlined in their application and to thereafter operate and police the various facilities. Will the MBRCT be carrying out the work on its own account or as agent for the TDC as freehold owner of the site and on what basis?

The cost of completing the project is now said to be \$2.9 million, however large signs displayed around Māpua for about 12 months stated the cost to be \$1.9 million (signs now changed to \$2.95 million). At a meeting in the

What will the actual cost be?

The site plans attached to the article and on the MBRCT website differ in a number of material ways from the site plan included in the RMA application. For example, the former shows a floating pontoon as part of the boat ramp whereas there is no such pontoon shown on the application site plan.

The OCEL (Offshore and Coastal Engineering Ltd) Consultants report on Tidal flows in the wharf vicinity, while making it clear the proposed Ramp can be used as an all tide launching ramp for "experienced boat operators" does not recommend the use of plastic pontoons because of the strong tidal flows across the ramp.

Wharf jumping is one of Māpua's many attractions for both locals and visitors alike. The MBRCT say: *"we are passionate about giving the youth and community groups a focal point in this gem of our area,"* but a very probable outcome of building the Boat Ramp in this location will be the total banning of all wharf jumping due to hazards from the many motorboats in such close proximity.

Is that what our community groups, our youth and our visitors really want?

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Streets for People

Māpua milestone marked

We've reached the exciting point where we're ready to hit the road with the initial pilot 'Streets for People' layout on Aranui Road.

The Streets for People programme is about flexibility and agility, although we are using concrete for some aspects of the work, nothing is set in stone. If there are features that don't appear to be working as well as we'd like them to, we can change them.



Students from Māpua School are on board too and are working on special Māpua themed artwork to enhance the project area.

We've spoken to numerous community groups including the local volunteer fire brigade who raised a few points about the layout as it was first proposed. So, modifications have been made to consider their needs when responding to emergencies.



There's been a lot of work done so far by a dedicated group of people from the Māpua community who have weighed up the pros and cons of a variety of design options for improving the safety of the street for walking and cycling.

Some of the themes that came through are that Aranui Road needs slower vehicle speeds, safe places to cross the road, and reduced congestion on the footpaths while keeping car parking for businesses. All this must fit funding constraints, engineering requirements and the geometry of the existing road corridor.

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MDCA June Public meeting

A summary of MDCA's 12th June Public meeting

resentation

Gordon Shaw – New Chair Māpua & Districts Business Association (MDBA) Gordon introduced himself, then summarized how MDBA is working to raise awareness of the association and its members. Membership area covers from

Motueka, Moutere, Māpua through to Appleby Hills. Annual membership fee is \$150.

Kim Drummond (GM TDC environment and regulatory) –Wastewater Overflows–

Kim's core role is to oversee regulatory processes and he meets with councillors every six weeks when they bring concerns to the table and his team facilitates discussion on how these concerns can be managed. Alcohol Regulation and the Boat Ramp Consents are also areas that fall under Kim's umbrella.

John Ridd (GGM Strategy and Services) and Mike Schurer (Water and Wastes Infrastructure Mgr) were also in attendance to help answer questions. Kim noted that in an ideal world we wouldn't have any wastewater overflows, and that tolerance of contamination is not acceptable, and accordingly the planning team is looking to move to a zero overflows tolerance policy.

The Resource Management Act (RMA) is currently being reworked by Govt. and until the new Acts are in place the current regulations remain in force. These regulations include a clause that allows overflow events to occur, but any events must be investigated to discover why they occurred and how in the future they could be mitigated. Questions like 'was it a planned event?', 'was it foreseen?', 'was it the result of a disaster?' all need to be considered when reviewing discharge events.

TDC is a unitary body, meaning they are both the regulator and the controller. If something goes wrong, an explanation needs to be forthcoming so a treatment to resolve the issues can be put into forward planning. TDC is aware stormwater is infiltrating the wastewater system and this is a big issue, but the reality is that at the moment it is difficult to hold individual residents and/or businesses accountable.

Open forum

Luke Donaldson, Duncan Andrew, Shaun McFadden spoke representing the 'Māpua Pump Track'. Thanks to Luke and his company 'Donaldson Civil' the Māpua pump track has been tidied up. The plan is to asphalt the track in the future however funding needs to be sourced. All community donations are welcome. Please visit their website mapuapumptrack.com for further information.

TDC councillor report

The first meeting for the Māpua Masterplan has occurred. Information is required for the community regarding infrastructure, roads etc. Working group is made up of Iwi representation who have been slow to respond,



Ward Councillors and staff. Minutes from the steering committee meeting will be made available to the community via TDC's website and a copy forwarded to MDCA.

'Streets for People': Changes have been made and will be incorporated into

a concept flyer that is due to be sent out to all residents. The speed limit will not be reduced to 30 kph through the main part of the village due to temporary speed limits not allowing emergency services to exceed the limit, whereas a permanent speed limit allows emergency services to travel up to 25 kph above the speed limit.

Christeen Mackenzie

The Waimea Community Dam is being filled in three stages to give the walls of the dam time to settle between each filling stage.

The Mayor is on leave for three weeks, with Stuart Bryant as Acting Mayor.

Deliberations have been made on the Annual Plan, with an 8.7% rate increase, with the decrease due to some forestry investment funds being redirected and the altering of the river works budget. Long Term Plan update and the Speed Managements plans are also in progress.

Reminder – Community Grant application scheme is now open and closes in July.

Enhanced public transport scheme kicks off in August – bus transport is from Motueka, through Māpua, Richmond to the hospital and airport.

TDC buildings have been assessed as having an earthquake risk – several solutions are being considered; however, decisions have not been made at this point, with a 10-year window for this upgrade to occur.

Dominion Flats

A small group of dedicated volunteers continue to turn up on Tuesday mornings. There are now resident Weka, so a request to dog walkers to please keep your dogs on a leash. Also, in November the project will reach its ten-year anniversary, an amazing milestone which will be celebrated on site – more information to come. The photo history boards are greatly appreciated by users of the area.

General business

Streets for People

Monthly update meeting – TDC/Consultants hosted Working Group/Residents and were joined by NZ Police representative. The team gave an overview of progress to date and collected feedback on potential locations for bike racks, planter boxes, kerbside seating and street art. The team are currently finalizing tenders for construction and expect costing/schedule update by end June.

Concerns were raised regarding the 'Streets for People' proposal, which included shifting the disabled carpark from in front of the Medical Centre to the other side of the road, as well as the plan for a shared pedestrians/cyclists pathway, with examples given of how this is unsafe for elderly residents with their dogs. The initial hope was that cyclists and pedestrians would be separated and have access to cycleways on both sides of the road – however, this is not possible due to road width and cost limitations. The final two-way shared pathways for both cyclists and pedestrians is wider than the current footpath, but is still considered by some residents/members as more dangerous than the status quo, based on both personal experience and NZTA statistics.

Cllr Christeen Mackenzie stated she would like to think that the statistics of what actually occurs once the trail is in place will be compared to the survey data. Cllr Mike requested those who have personally had or know of accidents that have occurred due to cyclists and pedestrians sharing a pathway to email him the details.

Bluff Hill

Layout changes have been made and the new solution appears to be working well with good visibility.

Aranui Road bus stops

Locations have been proposed opposite Māpua School Car Park and by Te Ora Health. Questions are asked as to why the bus is not going to the wharf to encourage out of towners to use it to get to the wharf facilities. The response was that first there needs to be a time period to assess user demand (six to twelve months), then route changes will be considered.

Some concerns were expressed regarding the impact of an "in-lane" bus stop opposite the Māpua Hall on emergency vehicles, especially if bus users are less able and take longer to get on and off the bus. Similarly, the proposed location of a bus stop in front of the Māpua Fruit and Vege shop was challenged, with members noting the need for the stops to be a good fit for all residents and businesses.

Super Liquor licensing application

The hearing will be held between 10am and 6pm (possibly 7pm) on the $18^{th} - 21^{st}$ July at the Māpua Hills Community Church on Aranui Rd.

These hearings are open to all the public.

Māpua Boat Club resource consent

The resource consent has been lodged with TDC. Please have a look at the resource consent online. Trustees are asking for the consent to be publicly notified. In the final design, the pontoon has been removed from the plans.

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Te Mamaku Native Corridor

Volunteers are urgently needed for Te Mamaku Native Corridor project.

This project beside SH60 between Tasman and Māpua is well underway for the 2023 planting season, having successfully completed Block 0 last year with great tree growth.



We are now ready for our contractors to plant 11,000 trees into Blocks 1 and 2, thanks to these generous funders: Rātā Foundation, Restoring the Moutere, Pub Charity, Nelson Building Society NBS, NZMCA, Trees That Count, NZ Landcare Trust & OneTree, Network Tasman, Tasman District Council, Whenua Iti Outdoors and individual donors.

Also we are thrilled to announce in breaking news that our project has been selected as the chosen Nelson/ Tasman project for the He Rā Rākau Tītapu - King Charles III Coronation Plantings, the New Zealand Government's official gift to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III.

"Over 100,000 trees will be planted around Aotearoa during 2023 and 2024 as part of this programme. A project has been selected for each region being delivered through a range of communities, iwi and hapū, farming and environmental organisations undertaking ecological restoration projects" says Emma Giesen from Trees that Count.

Our share of 7,000 trees from the He Rā Rākau Tītapu Fund will mean 1,200 trees will be planted in Block 5 this July and 5,800 trees in 2024 in Block 3.

"So come on Nelson/Tasman residents, join our volunteer team for July and August working bees to help us install over 12,000 plant guards and stakes", says Michael Markert, Project Co-ordinator. 

My husband admits he isn't much of a reader, but one of his heroes is the American theologian R.C. Sproul. We joke about what Sproul's initials might stand for—he even refers to himself as "R.C.", so as far as I'm concerned, it could be Ronald Cornelius, or it could be a Johnny Cash situation (Cash was born with the name J.R. because his parents couldn't agree what to call him).

This month my husband ordered one of Sproul's books. He's more of a race car builder than a reader, so if he finishes the book, it will be about the fifth non-engineering book he has completed in his life.

The book is called *The Holiness of God*, and in its opening chapter Sproul describes in detail the moment that time itself began: with God saying in Genesis 1:3, "Let there be light."

"The first sound uttered in the universe," Sproul writes, "was the voice of God commanding, 'Let there be!' It is, actually, improper to say that this was the first sound 'in' the universe because until the sound was made there was no universe for it to be in. God shouted into a void. The command created its own molecules to carry the sound waves of God's voice farther and farther into space.

"The speed of this imperative exceeded even the speed of light. As soon as the words left the Creator's mouth, things began to happen. The force of divine energy splattered against the sky like a kaleidoscope of colour hurled from the palette of the most powerful artist.

"The act of creation was the first event in history. The Supreme Architect spoke, and the seas were shut behind doors, and the clouds were filled with dew. He spoke again, and the earth began to fill with orchards in full bloom.

"And God said, 'That's good.""

The Biblical account of creation might appear a far too simplistic explanation of the beginning of the universe. But one clever man once stated, "The simplest answer is often the most correct."

Or, as my husband likes to say when creating components for his super saloon, "Simplicity is elegance; complexity is arrogance."

Say what you will about that, but I'm kind of relieved to believe in something simple, in this increasingly complicated world.

Restoring Higgs Reserve

The vision of the Higgs Reserve restoration project is two-fold: to help Nature Te Taiao to restore the 3 ha reserve towards its pre-human condition (as now possible); and to offer the opportunity for current and future generations to experience natural forest and wetland and a place of wonder within 2–3 km of Māpua.

Higgs Reserve at its core protects a precious 0.6 hectare remnant that has the character of the pre-human forest on the Moutere Gravels hillslope margins of Waimea Waimeha Inlet.

The reserve also features an intact vegetation sequence from freshwater to saline in reasonably good condition, that is extremely rare within the Moutere Ecological District. This is also habitat for banded rail.

However, much of the reserve is recovering from a long history of human impacts, aided by past restoration efforts including predator control (as outlined in last month's Coastal News).

Two mature kahikatea trees, two rimu, four black beech tawhairauriki and ten hard beech tawhairaunui, some spindly and damaged, emerge above the canopy and remind us of the forest that once was. Typical beech forest understorey species further attest to its original character (e.g. NZ blueberry tūrutu, crown fern tāniwhaniwha, broad-leaved mingimingi, silver fern ponga).

The project aims over three years for two inter-related ecosystem state changes:

- planting presently open plus weedy scrub habitats that will develop into tall, dense indigenous forest, into which species now occurring only in the intact forest can disperse.
- zero densities of ecosystem-altering weed species, with re-invasion only from externally sourced propagules that likely can be controlled long term without intensive management.

The project complements the Dominion Flat restoration project, on the other side of Māpua Drive, undertaken over the past decade by Helen and Neville Bibby and a host of other volunteers. The projects together will create a 9 ha habitat for native flora and fauna at the gateway to Māpua.

The project acknowledges mana whenua. It follows relevant provisions of the TDC Moutere-Waimea Ward Reserve Management Plan.

Over the past six months, we have focused on choking off the seed rain of our most problematic weeds (Robinia, barberry, blackberry, old man's beard, and gorse); 'first pass' weeding; transplanting or nurturing over 900 native tree and shrub seedlings into forest gaps; and planting over 200 native tree and shrub seedlings provided by Battle for the Banded Rail.

While our project entails physical labour, we get to delight in discoveries of plants and birdlife in the reserve, and 'releasing' many hundreds of previously planted seedlings that were being smothered by weeds and bracken. We're seeing young kāhikatea, black beech and hard beech seedlings that probably have not been as abundant in decades. There are no adult tanekaha trees currently in the reserve, but two tiny seedlings appear to have arrived via bird-carried seed. We hope planting kōwhai will in time attract kererū back.

Over the next year we seek to replant remaining open terrestrial areas, undertake regular weeding 'passes' of the reserve, and hunt out those weeds still lurking in the shadows. The project would then shift towards increasingly low input maintenance.

Like biodiversity around the world, Higgs Reserve will experience the effects of climate change, including sea rise progressively inundating the coastal margin and increased risks from extreme temperatures and rainfall, drought, and fire. All of us can play a part in helping to turn this around, by practising and promoting climate restoration.



Uniform Services - Fire Week


