Guest Speakers

TDC – Māpua Masterplan – by John Ridd and Dwayne Fletcher

TDC's John Ridd and Dwayne Fletcher addressed the newly developed Māpua Masterplan which will be looking at establishing an overarching and inclusive approach to future development within Māpua.

Dwayne started the presentation with an historical photograph of Māpua, a reminder that to make progress we must respect the past, i.e. access to the water. Pre and, post colonialism was very appropriate.

The timeline to have the Māpua Masterplan completed is the 3rd quarter of 2023. Dwayne explained the Masterplan will contain maps and aspirations with the hope that this plan will become the baseline guide for how future development occurs and may require policy and planning changes through TDC to achieve this. He noted that there is always a risk in this process that, a) deviations occur, b) community funding may not be available, and c) change of councillors that can impact support for future projects.

Ultimately the goals and visions within the Masterplan will need to be included within the LTP and taken into consideration during Plan Change and/or RMA decisionmaking if the Masterplan is to have a real impact. TDC – Streets for People / Aranui Drive cycleway

Vincent Revell from Frequency is the Project Manager consulting for TDC and made the presentation.

NZTA has made funding available to TDC for this project until June 2024 – hence this project, even though covered within the umbrella of the Māpua Masterplan, is working at speed ahead of the Masterplan development. The budget is planned to have a contingency, so funding is available to do tweaking after the new layout has been in operation. Wider community engagement will occur shortly within the next 1-2 months once the concept has been approved by TDC, with consultation via pop-up sites within the community and information available via scannable codes on posters, within Newsline etc.

During the initial trial period (May – August 2023) physical changes will include installing a cycleway along the eastern (Church) side of Aranui Road from Māpua School to Hardy Kids pre-school (next to Java Hut), including barriers, road markings, and pedestrian crossings to provide safe crossing points.

To make space for the cycleway, some parking will need to be removed. Additionally, the "village centre" between Java Hut and Toru St/Higgs Rd will be marked by "entrance ways" at each end and become a "shared roadway", where no cycleway will be provided and cyclists will be able to "claim the lane" with equal rights to motor vehicles (similar to Queen Street in Richmond), with a speed limit of 30km. *Continued on page 2*

No parking will be lost within this 'village centre' section other than to provide the required visibility adjacent to the new pedestrian crossing. Finally, the intention is to eventually continue the cycleway from Toru St/Higgs Rd down to the Tahi St Roundabout, and consideration is being given to extending the 30km/h speed limit to connecting roads also.

While this project will trial the initial concept, these changes will be semi-permanent with minor improvements possible, based on community feedback, to improve the cycleway's safety and functionality. A longer term and larger solution are outside the funding scope of the NZTA trial funding, and any future more permanent improvements/solutions will need to be funded by the ratepayer.

TDC Councillor Report:

Cllr Christine Mackenzie

- TDC are reviewing the Annual Plan over the next few months, including spend vs deliverables and inflationrelated budget impacts, with a need to balance affordability of providing services/asset against what communities desire.
- 10 year plan is reviewed every three years. Ratepayers should submit now on projects they would like to see included, but should remember everything comes at a cost.
- TDC have been busy submitting to Central Govt regarding proposed changes to the RMA, Three (five) Waters, and the Local Govt. Review.
- TDC CEO Janine Dowding returning mid-March after being on secondment to the DIA for the past year, will be back at the helm in TDC.
- As part of Christine's role as chair of the Operations committee, she toured St Arnaud, Tapawera and other country communities with Downer looking at roading issues. There is a plan to do a similar drive around of Māpua and the Moutere around mid-March, so if there are any roading issues you have concerns with, please bring these to Christine's attention via email.

Cllr Mike Kinnimonth

Mike informed the audience how fortunate the community is to have high-profile and engaged TDC managers such as John and Dwayne take such a close interest in the development of Māpua and we (the Māpua community) have a great opportunity to help make the most of this attention.



Two Boating Regattas coming up for Māpua



Is the annual Loyal Grossi Point Yacht Club Sailing Regatta at Grossi Point.

Entry is free and is open to all small sailing craft. The fleet usually ranges from Optimist and P class up to Hobie 16 cats and occasionally the odd Trailer Yacht.

The aim is to provide one event a season to get all of the local yachts that sail on the Estuary in the one place at the one time. Common boats are the various Catamarans

that are kept on the Estuary, along with the Sunbursts, Phase Twos, and Lasers that make regular appearances. Plus, the larger monohulls, like the Welson Navigators, and the Tamaha Sea Scout Cutters.

The entries are divided into three classes, Cats, Monohulls, and Cruisers. Less experienced sailors can enter the cruising division, even if they own a faster boat.

This season the biggest tides are again mid-week, but while the Club considered having the event on a Thursday, it has been decided to sail at the weekend and modify the course to suit.

The aim is to run two quick races before the tide begins to ebb. Briefing is under the flag at Grossi Point at 12.30pm on March 12th, with the first start scheduled for 1pm. If conditions are suitable, the start time may be brought forward 15 minutes.

The course is centred on the Western side of Grossi Point, and great viewing is available. Bring your gear if you don't have a boat but would like to go for a sail.

All sailors must wear a solid foam Buoyancy Aid, and boats need to have a painter (towline) fitted.

Is the Annual Māpua Boat Club Regatta, at Port Māpua. This regatta is based at Māpua Wharf and caters for everything that floats that you are likely to have in your back yard. The day is especially chosen as it has the lowest high tide, and therefore the highest low tide of the season.

This means minimum tide rise, and maximum slack water time at the bottom of the tide.

The feature event is the Māpua Cup. A rowing race in Sea Scout Cutters between crews from the Māpua Boat Club, and the Tamaha Sea Scouts. Current holders are the Boat Club Women Crew.

Māpua Boat Club members with Power Boats provide the course laying and Patrol Boat duties.

The Seagull Outboard race is open to other makes 5HP and under. Bring your own boat!

The sailing race is open to yachts

of all sizes, and there are races for Kayaks and Paddle boards. These two classes are divided into Recreation and Competitive.

At slack water, the Nelson Radio Model Club will race their International One Metre Class RC yachts. Then the second event for each class will be held, followed by the Māpua Cup.

The Briefing for all competitors will be at 12 Noon on the beach at the bottom of the old ramp.

First event will be the Seagull Race at 12.30 and the prizegiving is expected to be about 3.15pm.

Entry is \$2 per boat/kayak/paddleboard, and entries will be accepted on the wharf before the briefing.

Personal Buoyancy must be worn by all entrants, and a tow rope fitted if you should want you craft rescued.

Overwhelming support for Māpua boat ramp

A recent survey of homeowners in the Māpua area has revealed overwhelming support for the building of a Māpua boat ramp and community facility to house the Tamaha Sea Scouts that is planned to be built at Waterfront Park says Andrew Butler, trustee of the Māpua Boat Ramp Community Trust and commodore of the Māpua Boat Club.

"Most homeowners will have had a visit during January or February from a person conducting a house survey asking whether or not they support the project which involves using some of the land on the west side of Tahi St for parking," Andrew says.

"This survey was conducted because the Trust wanted to make sure it had community support. Although the survey is not complete, the interim results could not have been better for us.

"At this stage, over 90 per cent of respondents have said they favoured the project. In fact, many people thought it was a done deal already and were surprised it was still being debated. Others asked 'when will it happen?' And some were very appreciative there was a group such as the Trust ensuring that a new facility is being built."

Andrew says the engineers are just putting the finishing touches on the resource consent application which was due to be lodged at the end of February.

The Māpua Community Boat Ramp is a three-year project that will provide safe access to the sea for all members of the community to use. The estimated \$2.95 million project is being partially funded by the Tasman District Council, with remaining funds being raised from the community. Donations are fully tax-deductible.







OWNER RESPONSIBILITY and the LAW

Vehicle safety is serious business. The continued safety of vehicle drivers, their passengers and all other road users is paramount. This is the reason behind regular audits of all WoF issuing authorities. The frequency of the audit is then determined by the results.

Before a site can issue WoFs they must first comply with standards set by NZTA. Once standards are met they are issued with a 'Certificate of Authorisation'. Likewise, each WoF inspector must sit theory and practical exams, testing both their knowledge of the rules and their practical abilities. Upon passing these exams they are issued with a 'Certificate of Appointment' Both of these certificates must be publicly displayed on site.

The purpose of WoF checks is to ensure each vehicle using national public roads attain minimum safety standards. If problems are identified during a WoF check, repairs need to be done before a current WoF will be issued. It is illegal for a vehicle to be used on the road without a

current WoF. When a vehicle has been inspected by an approved WoF inspector and has complied with all inspection items, a current WoF label is placed on the top right hand corner of the front windscreen. This



label shows this vehicle has been visually inspected and was roadworthy at the time of the last inspection.

Keeping your vehicle safe and up to WoF standards between inspections is crucial for you, your passengers and all road users safety and is legally required. MAPUA

Māpua Health Centre News

We are 33 years old!! And it's our birthday this month. That is the Māpua and Districts Health Centre came into being in the middle of March 1990 after an amazing effort by the local community in collaboration with the Nelson Area Health Board, who had just bought the site of the old post office.

It has gone through various metamorphoses and changes over the intervening years, with the latest being the addition of admin rooms and a staff room added to the back of the building. Many thanks to all the volunteer help that we have had over recent years and to the health committee who generously give their time and energy to looking after the building and equipment.

The committee that oversees the building is actively looking at how we can plan for the future and cope with the increasing population and changes in health provision (with some services likely to be devolved from the hospital to primary care). Ideally, we would like to build a new purpose-designed centre that also incorporated other services such as physiotherapy, pharmacy, dentist and other health professionals. If you have any ideas for achieving this or wish to help the committee contact the chairperson, Derek Craze (info@mapuahealth.com).

We are very fortunate to have Dr Coco Bardsley working with us on a Monday, Thursday and Friday. She is taking on new patients and we now have a full complement of medical staff which should allow us to see patients in a timely manner and avoid previous waiting times due to staff shortages.

The Treasury has informed us that "as the COVID-19 response starts to become part of standard public service delivery, future COVID-19 related costs will be managed within the standard Budget process". This means that it is likely that people will need to pay for Covid-19 related visits, except for Māori, Pasifika, those with a disability, over 65 or have a high-risk medical condition. Rapid antigen tests (RATs) and vaccinations would remain free. The details of this transition have yet to be released.

We now have nurses trained to offer advice about advance care planning. This gives everyone a chance to say what's important to them. It helps people understand what the future might hold and to say what treatment they would and would not want. It helps people, their families and their healthcare teams plan for future and end of life care.

This makes it much easier for families and healthcare providers to know what the person would want particularly if they can no longer speak for themselves. If this is something you are interested in exploring, please contact Māpua Health centre to make an appointment with one of our nurses.

Or to give it its full name The Māpua Ruby Bay & Districts Community Trust. It is that time of year when we consider applications for grants.

Profits from the Coastal News are transferred to this Trust and added to a Capital Fund. Interest from this is available for grants and is administered by 9 Trustees. Twice a year, applications for grants are considered.

The Trust was set up in 2004/5 with full charitable status.

The criteria for receiving grants are that the applicants should be voluntary organisations themselves or that they benefit a particular section of the community. So for example, sports clubs or the Hall can buy equipment to improve their facilities; the school, youth clubs or say Whenua Iti can provide services to more students than it could otherwise. What we don't fund are costs that go towards wages.

Since its inception we have made grants for a total of more than \$40,000 and recipients include the Hall, Spring Fling, RSA Community Library, Tamaha Scouts and several sports clubs to name just a few.


