Art works came from all over NZ and the standard was extremely high with a great variety of styles, genres and

Of 150 artists and 327 artworks submitted for the awards, 3 selectors anonymously chose 121 art works from 91 artists. These pieces were on display for 2 weeks at Māpua Hall from 1 - 15 October.

Judging took place on 1st October by 3 independent judges. They were: Min Kim of Bryce Gallery, Christchurch; David James of Atelier Gallery, Nelson; and Glenys Della Bosca (replacing Charlotte Giblin from New Plymouth who was unable to judge at the last minute due to personal circumstances).

Opening night was well supported with over 130 guests. The event was opened by our Tasman Mayor, Tim King. Awards valued at over \$10,000 were distributed to the winning artists.

All artworks were for sale and 29 purchasers collected their treasures at the end of the exhibition.

# BIRP – Bullivant Island restoration project

guess the first question for many is where is Bullivant Island? Easy answer – stand on Māpua Wharf look to the east across the channel and you will see Bullivant Island, a small island partly surrounded by Moturoa Island and from the Māpua side distinguished by a stand of old man pines running along its sandy ridge facing the channel.

For those of you who know Bullivant Island you'll know it's a great place to kayak to, spend a youth-full (or maybe not so youthful) overnight excursion on or have a relaxing and restful daytime explore.

Let me introduce the new kids on the block: the "BIRPers". Caring locals who reached out to the TDC Reserves and Facilities team some 12 months ago to see if we could work together to remove pest weeds that were starting to take over the Island and to plant native species that once thrived there.

Happily, the answer was yes and only 12 months on we have cut down the smaller wilding pines and wattle, stopped old man's beard, gorse, ivy, blackberry, etc, in its tracks. A planting plan has been instigated that has seen Totara, Kanuka, Manuka and Akeake planted – 400 in total to date.

This season the TDC Reserves and Facilities team has cut and/or poisoned the larger wilding pines and wattles.

Battle for the Banded Rail have supplied 4 traps for the Island which is helping to protect bird life from predator attack.

If you have the time, please take it to paddle/sail/swim over and have a look at what's happening in this very special part of Māpua – from the Māpua side you can't see the stands of Totara, Kanuka, Manuka and Akeake that are already naturally re-establishing, plus the great work put in by the BIRPers. And of course, if you land on Bullivant and see something you know is a weed, feel free to pull it out!

## Conquering money worries

A re you struggling to find money to pay your rent or mortgage?

Is grocery shopping a stress point in your life?

Are your children missing out on important events and activities?

There is hope for you through the free service provided by C.A.P. (Christians Against Poverty), either by attending one of the C.A.P. Money budgeting courses or through C.A.P. Debt Help.

Ross McLay and Teressa Hosie have been running C.A.P. Money budgeting courses for the last five years in the Māpua area. The courses help you learn to budget, spend and save so you reach your goals faster. When you use C.A.P. Money principles your money goes further. It's almost like getting a pay

rise! Two or three 90-minute sessions are all it takes and the course is completely free.

Earlier this year Teressa trained as a Debt Coach with C.A.P., continuing the growth of this service in the Tasman region. Dave Harris started with C.A.P. in 2014 based in Richmond and in 2020 Stephanie Bryant, who is based in Tasman, joined.

In the nine years since Dave started, 34 families or individuals have cleared their debts through the free service offered by C.A.P.

How does Debt Help work? One of the team meets the clients at their homes for a first visit to explain the process and what information they need to gather to assist with preparing a budget.

A second visit ensures we have all the information we need and then at a third visit we present a budget that starts their journey out of debt. C.A.P. doesn't pay the debt off for them; it manages the repayment on their behalf. So, the clients don't have to deal with creditors, which is a relief for many. A key component of the budget is making savings for future expenses such as warrant of fitness, car registration, doctors, school fees and so on.

A client who had started with C.A.P. earlier this year needed two tyres for her car's W.O.F. and she was

able to pay for these out of her savings with C.A.P

Previously she would have had to borrow to pay for a purchase like this. It is these new practices, which will see her well placed for the rest of her life. Surveys of past clients show that 93% of C.A.P. clients who become debt free continue to stay debt free.

The experience has been transformational.

## Old fashioned work at Māpua Estuary

Saturday 8th October was a day which had been planned for some time in Māpua.

The day dawned fine and calm and by 10:15am the high tide was starting to recede. By 12:15 pm, over 20 local boat club and Tamaha Sea Scout volunteers arrived with their spades and shovels, sunscreen and protective gum boots.

The aim of the day was to dig down to precisely locate a sewer pipe which had been laid approximately 20 years ago and although the Tasman district council had some "as built" plans, there was no guarantee they were accurate.

By about 4:00pm there were some shouts of excitement as the last person standing discovered the top of the 200mm high density polyethylene pipe down at 1200mm.

During those three hours, an iwi monitor from Motueka and several TDC staff had been watching from the side-lines.

Māpua has special significance for many people, particularly iwi as they had lived there on and off over the centuries.

The reason why it is necessary to find the pipe, is that the local community including the boat club are very determined to have a new boat ramp, as the last one which was built in 1989 is virtually useless now that commercial activity has taken over the area.

The plan is to build a new boat ramp on the southern edge of Waterfront Park and to also provide new facilities for the Tamaha Sea Scouts.

As part of this process, the Māpua Community Boat Ramp Trust has had several meetings over the last couple of months with Iwi, local business, council staff, councillors and the local community.

Council has set aside \$700,000 towards the project.

## Māpua Boat Ramp Community Trust (MBRCT) supported by Tamaha Sea Scouts

As attendees arrived at the Hall everyone was greeted with a handshake by four uniformed members of the Kea and Cub troop.

Trevor Marshall (MBRCT trustee) spoke about the history of the boat ramp at Māpua Wharf and TDC's promise at the time of the impending business development at Māpua Wharf that this development would not impede residents' use of the boat ramp.

However, as time has passed and more spaces have been made available for business development, access to the boat ramp has become more restricted to the current two-hour window. This reduced access has a major impact not only on the local boating community, but it has also made it extremely difficult for Tamaha Sea Scouts to access their equipment storage facility at the wharf and has significantly reduced the space available to them where they can conduct their activities.

It has also inhibited the Sea Scout group to grow and restricts them from being able to meet local membership demand. Just recently 30 local children had dropped off the waiting list after several years due to them becoming older than what the troop is able to cope with. With improved facilities the Sea Scouting opportunity would have been available to these 30 unlucky children.

This proposal is seen as a very important facility to ensure continuity of a long-valued asset within the community that has spanned many generations, and to ensure the children of our community have the ability to learn the skills required to enjoy the sea in a safe manner.

This new facility will also ensure the Sea Scout troop can open spaces for more children to join as well as enabling the youth within our community to become involved locally.

This proposal offers a win-win opportunity for the community in that it will free Grossi Point to becoming more family friendly with the removal of powered boats. Grossi Point has the potential to become a spot where swimming and the use of non-powered craft (kayaks, paddle boards, dinghies etc) can be used without the interference of powered craft. The proposal also offers many non-monetary benefits as well.

The desire of MBRCT is for the first stage of this project, which includes the building of the ramp and the storage/meeting room facilities, to be completed by April 2024, December 2024 at the latest.

Tamaha Sea Scout Representative (Amanda) explained the functions of the Sea Scouts and the opportunities and activities the children are exposed to.

After a question-and-answer session the audience were asked to raise their hands if they were in support of the proposal – huge support was received amongst the audience.

**TDC Councillor report** Christeen Mackenzie was the only current councillor present at the meeting and reported the following:

Holding Company for Nelson Airport and Port Nelson These two businesses are owned by Nelson City Council (NCC) and TDC with a 50% shareholding each. NCC has had a change of heart and has now agreed to a Holding Company to be set up enabling monies to be borrowed at a cheaper interest rate saving ratepayers dollars each year.

**Tasman Environment Plan (TEP).** This plan dictates what you can do on your land. TDC will be having an informal engagement with community to bring the community up to date with how things are progressing. Christeen assured us this engagement was a two-way conversation.

**Better off Funding** TDC has been allotted \$22million with \$5million being received in the next financial year. The details of this have been released to the media. Christeen reassured the audience that this money did not have any strings attached / commitments associated with TDC acceptance of the 3 Waters proposal.

**New bus routes** New and increased bus services between Motueka – Māpua – Richmond – NSN Airport – NSN Hospital – and NSN City will commence July next year.

Question: Christeen was asked when the MSP survey results will be made available to the community. Christeen will follow this up.

#### Māpua Community Hub

Vicki Stocker reported the fundraising plant stall was extremely successful and thanked everyone who donated plants and those who purchased plants.

#### Māpua Liveability

- MDCA are keeping regular contact with TDC.
- TDC recognize with so much occurring in the Māpua area, there is a need to have a coordinated approach.
   Dwayne Fletcher (TDC Infrastructure Manager) will be providing a coordinated overview of all projects.
- Tentative dates have been set for the November Community Engagement Sessions to be held at the Māpua Bowling Club. Dates should be confirmed by mid-October.
- TDC have acknowledged the original February 2023 completion date for the MSP may not be achievable.
- TDC have been made aware of the importance for them to come back to the community to explain their rationale behind their decisions/choices prior to the MSP being finalized.
- Jim Vause stated the survey process of analysis is not clear from the MSP 2010 and is not easy to find within TDC system and stated there appears to be a disconnect between what the 2010 MSP promises and what has been reported. A motion was accepted to follow this up.
- A question was asked to what is required to lift the deferment on deferred zonings, and more broadly to what extent the current water/wastewater/storm water infrastructure can accommodate housing growth within the current residential/service rural residential areas.

#### **Roads and Pathways**

**Slips Bluff Hill Ruby Bay** Unfortunately, TDC are still waiting for the Geotech report. Even though they have been continually promised a receive date this keeps getting pushed back. TDC have a will to reopen the road and depending on the awaited report will determine whether this is feasible.

Jamie McPherson (TDC) stated that with big diggers and trucks, the Bluff slip could be cleared within 10 days of the work commencing. The fill removed could be relocated as one option into McKee Domain to build up the western side where it has been prone to flooding.

If opening the road becomes prohibitive, TDC will engage with the community regarding alterative options. There is more to this decision than the stability of the cliff, there is also a legal issue regarding the landowner's property at the top of the cliff that needs to be worked through.

Concern from a Pomona Road resident was aired regarding the damage that is occurring along Pomona Road due to the huge increase in traffic volumes. TDC are aware of this problem and are monitoring it.

**Dominion Flats** TDC have given enough funding to purchase additional plants to be planted at the Dawson Road end of the track. The Motueka Men's Shed is making a plaque that will illustrate the historical progress of the plantings. All helpers are welcome each Tuesday morning at Dominion Flats.

#### **General Business**

**Three Waters** The proposed scope at this stage has not changed even though TDC would prefer to be included within the South Island Entity rather than the Upper

South/Lower North Island Entity as it currently stands. Process of the Three Waters entity is well advanced with CEO/Staff transfers/Transition Unit already set up prior to legislation being passed.

MDCA works closely with TDC to ensure our community functions in a way that suits the majority of our residents. To have a vote that counts, become a financial member of MDCA by simply paying \$10.00 per person per year into our NBS account 03 1354 0356471 using your name and phone number as references.

Juliette Brett took out both these prizes with her photo of "Squawky – Land Ahoy" photo and her Riwaka Rope photo.










### Grease the movie!

## Rohe Köreporepo

### The Swamp - The Sacred Place

A film by Kathleen Gallagher -Māpua Hall 21 November 2022 - 7.30 pm.

Repo (wetlands) are of huge environmental significance. They are hotbeds of biodiversity. The documentary Rohe Kōreporepo (2021) follows teams of kaitiaki (guardians) throughout Aotearoa New Zealand as they re-plant and re-flood dying wetlands and swamps.

Wetlands are like terrestrial sponges – when it rains, they soak up water. When it's dry, they slowly release moisture to nearby land and groundwater reservoirs. They also trap sediments running off the land, helping to keep our rivers and oceans clean. Wetlands provide the best natural defence against devastating floods and storm surges and above all they store carbon.

Despite occupying only between 5-8% of the earth's land surface, wetlands hold between 20-30% of the earth's estimated global soil carbon.

To Aotearoa's European settlers, wetlands were one of the country's most maligned geographical features. To create dry land for farming and settlements, wetlands were deprived of water — rivers were widened and diverted, willows were planted, and swamps were drained, until only ten percent of the country's wetlands remained.

In Rohe Köreporepo – The Swamp, the Sacred Place we are introduced to the diversity of Aotearoa's wetlands. We meet tangata whenua, landowners, government agencies and an army of volunteers who are using mātauranga Māori and scientific knowledge to restore wetlands.

Kathleen Gallagher is a filmmaker and a writer. She has authored three collections of poetry, 17 full-length plays and eight feature films.

Her films Earth Whisperers Papatuanuku, Water Whisperers Tangaroa and Seven Rivers Walking Haere Mārire have received top ratings in both Aotearoa New Zealand and International film Festivals.

Kathleen's highly acclaimed novel Earthquakes and Butterflies was published in 2015. Her most recent novel Inangahua Gold was shortlisted in the NZ Heritage Book Awards 2019

The screening will be followed by short presentations from local lwi and wetland experts, some of whom featured in the film.

We are very pleased that Irene Minchin is now part of our medical team, and she is providing a wide range of GP related services from Tuesday to Thursday each week.

Also, Megan Peters is our clinical pharmacist who is providing comprehensive review of medication consultations for 2 days each week, which can be very helpful for sorting out any concerns about the medicines that patients are taking.

Our patient portal, ManageMyHealth (MMH), has expanded its services for registered patients so that in addition to being able to view your results and clinical notes, send texts and request appointments, you can request prescriptions and pay for them at the same time. The SunSmart, www.sunsmart.org.nz has some valuable information and resources to help protect skin and eyes from UV radiation, as well as warning signs of skin cancer.

This month is Movember month. The state of men's health needs urgent attention. Men experience worse longer-term health than women and die on average six years earlier.

Prostate cancer rates will double in the next 15 years. Testicular cancer rates have already doubled in the last 50. Three quarters of suicides are men. Poor mental health worldwide leads to half a million men taking their own life every year. That's one every minute.

The Movember Foundation is looking at ways that men think and act on their health, including

- Understanding how traditional notions of masculinity can impact on men's mental health
- The way health services are provided to men
- New tests and treatments required to be developed to slow or stop disease progression
- Transforming health systems to place a stronger focus on outcomes that matter to men

It is also World Diabetes Day this month. Unfortunately, diabetes has become an epidemic related to modern lifestyles and more than 257,000 New Zealanders now live with diabetes.

The chances of developing diabetes increase if you are overweight, not very active, and eat a lot of food high in sugar. In fact, sugar remains a major concern, and in a report entitled "Sugar Is the New Tobacco, so Let's Treat It That Way" an analysis of 175 countries revealed that for every additional 150 sugar calories available for consumption, there was an 11-fold increase in the prevalence of type 2 diabetes in the population (Medscape - Oct 31, 2016).

And to make things tricky for those trying to stop putting sugar in food and drinks, new research shows that aspartame and other non-nutritive sweeteners (such as sucralose and saccharin) are not metabolically inert and can alter the gut microbiome in a way that is detrimental to blood glucose levels (Medscape - Aug 19, 2022). However, stevia is a plant-based sweetener which appears not to affect blood sugar (Avicenna J Phytomed. 2020 Mar-Apr).

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## KIWISKIN news - from the Māpua Skin Clinic

ifty treatments for warts

The bits of warts we can see are like hats made of dead skin and they are often very thick. The wart hides under the hat stack A stack of layered skin like a stack of hats. Like cat in the hat hats.

To slay a wart, it is necessary to melt through all the hats so we can get to its 'inside bits'.

#### How to remove a wart's hat

Warts hats can often be removed by freezing it with liquid nitrogen.

#### Stubborn hats

The thing that makes warts more than a little bit annoying is that no-one knows when a wart will go. We do know for certain that eventually warts get sick of having their protective skin hats removed and that one day they will give up and disappear. The thing is, there are stubborn warts with cheeky attitudes and huge hat stacks of skin and these can take much longer to cure (sometimes a year or two) whereas little warts with tiny hats might only need one freeze. That's why it's good to get onto them before their heads get too big and their hats get too many.

## Aspirin (salicylate) comes from willow trees and is excellent for helping to take the skin hats off warts

If a wart or verruca is stubborn, we can also use aspirin creams and solutions on it to help dissolve its hats quicker. The chemical in aspirin is called 'salicylate' ... so there you go simple old aspirin, curer of headaches and smasher of warts. Aspirin comes from willow trees, and that is why, by the way, if your goat has sore knees, you can cheer it up with a snack of willow leaves. ta dah!

If need be, your GP can ask the pharmacy to mix aspirin into creams to help things along. The pharmacy will also have wart paints with aspirin in them. The thing is, after a while, the treatment will make the skin tender and inflamed and that's the feeling of a wart's hat falling off. That's when it's good to give things a rest, and then start treating the 'next hat down' when the skin is feeling comfortable again.

Often a nurse or a doctor can help take the warts hats off with liquid nitrogen. Freezing is especially effective for little warts with small hats. The liquid nitrogen, which causes a brief sting, gives the warty skin frost bite; the frozen skin dies, makes a scab and then, when that comes off, there's less wart. On a great day, there's no wart left after one treatment!

#### Vigorous warts

Warts heal quickly and immediately start strengthening their hats. This means we have to persevere; because the hat stack can have many layers, especially on feet we may have to work our way down through the layers to get to the wart's 'brains'. That means we must keep removing the hat. If we stop when the wart hasn't fully cleared, then it will grow new hats and then we have to start treatment all over again.

## Warts and verrucas don't like moisture ... make them soggy

Warts hate being wet. The best way to get the hat off a wart is to make it soggy. The thick, diseased, skin over the wart (its layer of hats) protects its squishy middle 'brain and root bits' and that's the bit we need to get to.

The skin of the warts hat is like a 'jiffy pot' (the papier mâché pots used for seedlings) and like jiffy pots, when they are soggy it begins to crumble. The wart's brain/roots bits don't like having its hat taken off at all, because it makes the wart vulnerable, and so warts often grow a stack of hats (thick layers of skin) to keep their insides safe.

That means to treat warts we must keep taking the hats off until we get to the 'brains'. When the hats are gone, warts get terrified and try to make new hats (grow new protective skin). If we persist, one day it gets the wart message and goes away completely. Where? We don't know. If anyone knows where warts go let us know. Maybe it's like elephants and whales ...maybe warts have a secret place where they go to die.

#### How to make a verruca (wart on the sole of foot) soggy.

Cover the verruca with plastic electrical tape; this traps sweat, and the moisture makes the wart soggy. Then, when it's soggy enough, you can scrub off the soggy hat (dead skin) with a scrubbing brush, pumice, or sandpaper and then put the tape back. You might notice a hole developing; that's because the verruca is at the bottom of the thick layer of hats. The hole is actually a tunnel of missing hats through the thick layers of dead skin that protect our feet from gravel and prickles. The hole will gradually disappear quickly when treatment is finished.

#### Extra tips

- 1. Sometimes it can be hard to make tape stick on skin; clean the oils off the skin with alcohol, spray Opsite medical spray (some people tell me they use hair spray) on the skin and let it dry. This creates a thin layer of plastic for the tape to stick to and so it will stay on longer. It's a neat trick for sticking plaster too.
- 2. Be careful not to make a wart bleed by over scrubbing, the blood is infectious and can seed new warts.

#### Closing

So, there you go liquid nitrogen, plastic tape, pumice, and willow trees. With concerted effort, one day Māpua will be even more famous because of our 'excellent feet'. Go Māpua!

What do you think of this short quote I read recently? "You will live in awe of what you credit with the blessing in your life.

You will worship whatever it is that you think has produced what you celebrate."

If awe of God does not grip your heart, the anxieties of life will likely influence how you live; you will instead want to be in control of everything and everyone else in your life.

## Scenic drive or dead end-Ruby Bay awaits its fate

Twenty years ago, Kester Macfarlane and I returned to New Zealand for good. We'd found the best seaside spot in Australasia. Stafford Drive, Ruby Bay had everything: a big if rather odd house, water you could actually swim in and panoramic views. It also had three shops.

We sold our commercial-residential property in teeming Crown Street, Sydney and took on the racket of SH60. We knew the bypass was coming, weathered its effects and came to appreciate the ever-more-popular Ruby Coast Scenic Drive.

That was then. In August, days of torrential rain caused a massive slip blocking said drive. Stafford Drive is now effectively a dead end (or an idyllic cul-de-sac, depending on your viewpoint).

Kester thrived on new enterprises. Revival of the old and unlovely Ruby Bay Store was to be his ultimate venture. He wanted a community-oriented tearooms as in years long gone, with a boutique theatre, gallery and vintage treasures. 'We recognised the need for a flexible space for the community to share,' he wrote at the start.

With time and effort, much of it voluntary (especially by Chrissie Small) and of course money, the old store was reimagined. Local MP and Cabinet Minister Damien O'Connor officially opened it in July. Manatū Taonga (the Ministry of Culture and Heritage) made a grant to foster Kester's vision of an arts and community focus.

But to make Ruby Bay Store Theatre Gallery and Tearooms work for the community, it must work as a tourism business too. Kester's final and not quite complete project has become my concern, along with the future of the two high-quality shops on Stafford Drive. Without a through road and the people it brings, will one of those brown tourist signs change anything?

His is not the only business affected. What of the Tasman Store, the McKee Reserve? The Tasman District Council has big debt. Clearing the slip and fixing the road (properly this time) will cost and carries future risk from climate change. A decision is imminent.

Coastal residents have long understood the effects of rising sea levels. We've suffered through Tropical Cyclone Fehi and we've become a coastal hazard zone. The TDC's focus in deciding the road's fate should be on bringing communities together, not cutting them off from one another. We plead for a positive outcome. If it's decided the road can never be two lanes again, it should at least become one with traffic lights, as people have suggested.

Ruby Bay was bypassed once before, and we are bypassed now. Please take a stand: appeal to our mayor and councillors; sign and share Tony Robson-Burrell's Reopen Ruby Bay Bluff Road (Stafford Drive) petition at www.change.org.

I am writing this because my husband Kester died on October 11.

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
### **Book Reviews**

There is something very satisfying in reading books set in familiar places and in familiar times. These three NZ contemporary fiction books take you to the suburbs of Wellington during a COVID 19 lockdown, the streets of Christchurch after the earthquakes, and the McKenzie Basin area in the grips of winter.

#### Eddy, Eddy by Kate de Goldi (2022)

This book was reviewed on Radio NZ recently. I had never heard such a compelling book review and one that turned out to be totally justified upon reading.

It is the coming-of-age story of Eddy who is 19 years old and struggling with a sense of identity, love, loss, and religion. It is two years since the earthquakes hit his hometown of Christchurch, since he was expelled from




school, and since suffering an enormous loss in his life. With the earthquake recovery as the backdrop, we follow him in his own recovery after these traumatic events.

Eddy does not have an immediate family as he was orphaned at a young age but there is such a vibrant array of quirky, flawed, and endearing characters moving in and out of his life that he does come to know some sense of a loving and influential family. I did not want to say goodbye to any of these characters. And neither will I as the book definitely requires a second reading, to spend more time "wallowing" in the exquisite language of it.

#### Loop Tracks by Sue Orr (2021)

Charlie is the central character here and at 16 years old

she makes a decision that will profoundly define her life. We move with her then to 2020 when she is 50 years old and living in Wellington with her teenage grandson. pandemic, The Covid19 lockdowns, the New Zealand General Election and the euthanasia referendum become central to the story along with the core theme of intergenerational trauma.



There are so many subjects explored in this


book but never in a forceful way, just with insightful observations (through the various characters) of where we are at socially and politically in NZ. Abortion, addictions, euthanasia, adoption, sexual assault, conspiracy theories are all covered. But the love and complex relationship between the grandmother and her grandson does beautifully take centre stage.


Orr's writing is superb, and this book will stay with me for a long time.

#### Wintertime by Laurence Fearnley (2022)

Set around Lake Tekapo in the bitter cold of winter this atmospheric book wraps you in a sense of chill and isolation, not just in the setting but also in the story.

The main character (Roland) has returned from Australia to his family home to try and find out what happened to his younger brother who died mysteriously.





He confronts these memories alone now with no remaining family, no close friends in the area and an unsupportive, strained relationship with his partner in Australia.


At the same time Roland discovers the simmering and growing controversy in the area between hunters, Himalayan thar cullers, conservationists, and developers.

Social media plays a challenging and dangerous role in this tension and soon becomes pivotal to the story.

As in all of Fearnley's books there is such vividness in the environments created. Her award-winning 2010 novel *The Hut Builder* had a wonderful alpine setting and that is where she returns. It is a beautiful read especially if you are familiar with the McKenzie Basin area.

All three books are available in Māpua Library.
