

## Māpua & Districts Community Association (MDCA)

he Public Meeting was held on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> November at the Māpua Hall.

Alastair Clement, Team Leader Natural Hazards & Geomorphology at the TDC, gave a very interesting and timely Māpua & Districts presentation given the impact of this past COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION year's extreme weather events.

The role of his team includes maintaining a comprehensive database on natural hazards and geomorphology, and modelling of historic and potential future flooding events, sea level change, coastal inundation/erosion/subsidence and wave heights within Tasman Bay.

To achieve this, Alastair described how his team undertake event reconnaissance and post-event surveying and mapping to maintain up-to-date monitoring of our region's river and coastal environments.

He noted how historical photos and imagery have been useful to calibrate/validate TDC's flood models. Digital rain gauges across the region will also provide real time feedback on actual rainfall rates/amounts to better calibrate the new weather radar that will be installed within the next few years.

Alastair discussed a few of the recent and ongoing studies being conducted on the Waimea and Moutere rivers/inlets, and provided insights on why flooding patterns differ across these two main catchment areas, with river mouth width/depth and access of storm surge into the inlets being major factors.

Residents who want to know more can view Hazard Maps/Reports on TDC's Environmental Map Viewer website.

Our Ward Councillors were present, with Mike Kininmonth, Dave Woods and Dean McNamarra currently being inducted and Council roles being assigned. Dave, a Ruby Bay resident, will be the MDCA's primary contact, with Mike covering Brightwater/Wakefield and Dean Ngatimoti/Dovedale.

Mike reminded members that the Leisure Park has a dog free area marked off for pied stilt nesting. Mike also noted that a request to TDC and NZTA for speed reduction signage at the SH60/Mapua Rise intersection had been declined, and that now that the Boat Ramp is not proceeding Council is awaiting a Cultural Impact



Assessment on Grossi Point prior to any decision on future works.

Regarding Roads and Pathways, based on updated Geotech advice, plans are underway to re-open the Ruby Bay Bluffs Rd to two-way traffic before Xmas.

On Māpua Drive the recent relocation of the Radar Speed Sign was based on feedback from the Police Liaison Officer on increased speeding on upper Māpua Drive. The original location mounting remains and Police intend to move signs as needed based on driver behaviour.

Regarding parking on Māpua Drive, outside Aranui Park, the new signage combined with enforcement activities has had the desired effect, with cars-for-sale no longer present within this area.

The Community Emergency Preparedness Plan (CEPP) has now been completed and was formally launched at the Community Emergency Preparedness Day at Māpua Hall on 29<sup>th</sup> November.

The CEP Team's focus will now be on working with the Māpua Hall Committee on setting up the Hall to be our Community Emergency Centre and encouraging a wider network of Neighbourhood Groups. Any queries regarding the CEP team activities can be addressed to mapuacepp@gmail.com.

MDCA's final Public Meeting for 2025 will be held at the Māpua Community Hall on Monday 8th December at 7pm when our guest speaker will be Luke Kilworth from property developer Brookfield, who will introduce his company and seek feedback on what housing options are desired by our community.

Finally, MDCA is planning a refresh of our website - so stayed tuned for updates.

## Māpua Community Wellbeing Trust (MCWT)

2 025 has been a very positive year for the Trust, starting in January when Trust and Working Group members workshopped our Strategic Plan.

Three clearly stated objectives ensued:

- 1) Clarify the role of the MCWT
- 2) Expand MCWT's reach in the community
- 3) Ensure MCWT becomes sustainable

Within these objectives were clearly defined goals and actions. One such goal was that MCWT add value to the work of external groups by addressing information gaps and improving access to services. A specific action stemming from this was the setup of services as described below.

#### **Click and Connect service**

The Trustees identified a need for technical support in the community and started a free help session one afternoon a week in the Library - called Click & Connect. A number of volunteers have joined to share the load, and we hope to expand this to include Saturdays in the New Year.

#### Drop-In Centre - six month trial period in Māpua Hall.

The trial period ended in October with the numbers who visited very small and infrequent. A brainstorming session with volunteers, post the trial, highlighted the need to more specifically target wellbeing needs in the community.

As a result, the Trust will look at setting up Wellbeing discussion groups/talking cafes and plan a year's worth of sessions in advance. These might involve a short presentation followed by discussion/chat sessions targeted at different sectors of the community (e.g. youth, aged care, young parents, etc).

#### **District Health Nurses**

The District Nurses clinic continues in the front office of the Hills Community Church. The Trust continues to explore potential avenues to expand this type of service, but current economic conditions dictate that no further medical outreach arrangements with Health NZ (Te Whatu Ora) have been put in place this year.

#### **Youth Initiative**

The Hills Community Church have appointed a new part time Minister with a strong children and young family focus. Rev. Emily Holmes and Robyn Weller (a member of the congregation) have set up a community wide Kid's Club in Term 4 which has received strong interest including from the MCWT.

Discussions with Rev. Emily are looking forward to the senior members of the Kid's club moving on to College/ High School from next year and hopefully becoming the foundation of a youth programme. Rev. Emily's husband Greg has a youth focus and is keen to pursue this. The Trust have partnered with HCC around these youth initiatives and indicated a willingness to contribute financially toward costs.

#### **Plant Sale**

Jan Patterson, Lyn McCulloch and Liz McPherson coordinated and ran another very successful Plant Sale in September. Over \$3,000 was raised and the Trust agreed that profits from this year's Plant Sale be donated toward establishment costs for the Kid's Club.

Jan, Lyn and Liz have indicated that they are retiring this year but will be available to mentor the next group of Plant Sale organisers. The Trust are actively seeking interested volunteers keen to continue this very worthwhile and popular fundraising project.

All the Trustees sincerely thank Jan, Lyn and Liz for their sterling work running the annual Plant Sale – it has become a community event thanks to their determination and hard work.




Reduce the risk of your vehicle breaking down while you are away on holiday by organising a pre-holiday vehicle inspection.



A brief note on Aranui Park:

Aranui Park was gifted to New Zealand in 1977 by Dorothy and Bernard Wells who owned the parkland and modified wetland.

The owner after WW1 was Arnold Wells, Bernard's father, who was an orchardist. He lived on his orchard that he called Mt Hope, currently being developed for housing. Originating from Taranaki he claims he could see Mt Taranaki from his veranda, hence the name of Mt Hope.

Arnold was a keen botanist as well as a gifted musician. He used to sing hymns to his cows as he milked them in the milking shed. The shed was rebuilt as a hay barn by his son Bernard, a building in the centre of Aranui Park as a reminder of the Wells family. The huge variety of large exotic trees in Aranui Park is another legacy of the family. (David Mitchell 2014)

More recent plantings are predominantly native species. The function of the land is to serve as a remnant of our natural heritage, permanently free from urban sprawl.

The land was officially gifted to the Lands and Survey Dept to our nation in 2003.

## Birds Nesting in Māpua Estuary

Variable Oystercatcher - Torea-Pango

There are two pairs of birds nesting in the Māpua estuary just off the causeway near the Leisure Park.

Please keep your dogs on a lead and stay well clear of the nesting area. The best observation of the nesting area is from the Leisure Park causeway.

Variable Oystercatchers are mostly black with long



bright orange bill and coral pink legs, their eyes have a red iris, and the eye ring is orange.

They are often highly aggressive towards people close to their nest or chicks, dive

bombing, and screeching so please keep clear.

They also undertake fake distraction displays on the ground in defence of eggs or chicks. They breed in monogamous pairs and defend territories vigorously against neighbours.

Nests are normally simple scrapes in the sand, and two or three eggs are laid in November. Incubation is shared and takes about 28 days. The chicks fly at about seven weeks [February].

## Protected Trees of Māpua

#### Part 3 of 3

Thank you to a keen reader who pointed out that the project to identify trees of historical, scientific or cultural value in our area started back in the 1970s (50 years ago). Part One of this article (September 2025 Issue) stands corrected on this point.

Council report authored by Matt Heale on this work is online here, [QR code] referring to 'Notable Trees', rather than 'Protected Trees'. The Council now consults with Iwi to recognize Te mana o te Taiao, or the mana (power) of the natural world in making development decisions involving Notable Trees.



The main threat to Notable Trees in Tasman is development of land for housing and infrastructure. While most of these trees are specimens imported to New Zealand, they now provide valuable habitat for wildlife, oxygen in exchange for carbon dioxide and protection from UV exposure for all of us.

Twelve of the 575 Notable Trees in the Tasman District Council are in Māpua. You can see their physical locations on this map here. [QR code]

Parts One and Two of this article (September and November Issues of the Coastal News) described the first ten trees.

The last two trees are a mystery to me as I have not seen them in person.

T867, a Fraxinus or Ash tree is on private land in Ruby Bay. This tree is in the same genus as olive trees and lilac bushes, known for longevity and large size. It would have been planted in a homestead location by early orchardists.

The last tree is hiding in plain sight – see if you can find it! T648 is a Quercus ilex or Holm Oak, located at the Southeastern edge of Aranui Park (on the Aranui Road side). You will see a small white ceramic plaque with its number on it.

Originally from the Mediterranean region, Holm Oaks are known for tolerance to salt winds, their leaves don't fall off in winter and they can be used to grow truffles.

We have other magnificent specimen trees in Māpua that are not officially on the TDC Notable Tree register. Here are a few that are personal favorites, easily visible to the public:

Gum trees at the lower end of Pomona Road.

What are your favorite trees in Māpua? We'd love to hear about these and why they are important to you.

For example, there was a community effort to save the Ngaio tree at the wharf which is ever popular with people of all ages for climbing and shade.

Also, the blue flowering (Jacaranda?) tree by the tennis courts is very well looked after and provides us all with year-round beauty. We'd love to hear more about it.

## **Book Review**

## My favourite reads of 2025 from the Māpua Library.

#### The Mires by Tina Makereti (Aotearoa fiction, 2024)

This is one of those books I did not want to end. The

characters are so real some you grow to love, and those you don't love you certainly recognise.

The story is set in a block of council flats on the Kāpiti Coast, on land that was once a wetland - only a small part of the wetland is left now (hence the title).

It is set in the near future and centres on three women who live in those flats.

Keri is a Māori mother with two children who has fled Australia because of domestic violence.

Sera has arrived with her husband and daughter as refugees from an unnamed country that has become uninhabitable because of climate change.

Janet is an older Pākehā woman who has an adult son exhibiting extreme views and behaviours.

These are three mothers in the story, but there is also a fourth – the 'swamp mother'. Makereti gives a beautiful voice to the nearby swamp, drawing on its wisdom, memory, and Māori ancestral knowledge. Because of this fourth voice you feel as if you become part of the landscape itself, the misty wetlands with all its secrets, power, and history – beautiful writing.


The narrative blends environmental, cultural, and social tensions into a haunting story about belonging, connection, and the unseen forces that shape our lives.


I would also recommend another of this author's books available in the library, Where the Rēkohu Bone Sings.

## Playground by Richard Powers (fiction, 2024)

Playground is Richard Powers's latest thought-provoking work. I will definitely read it again because it is such a clever novel, brilliantly weaving together multiple storylines and themes.

It is simultaneously an environmental story (with the focus on the ocean), a tech story the (exploring possibilities and dangers of AI), and a human story (with cast of wonderfully diverse characters).






Some effort was required to get into it at first, but it was absolutely worth it. And the cleverness at the end takes the book to a whole new level of impact!

The story centres on the island of Makatea in French Polynesia, an island scarred by the mining of phosphorus over many years. The area has now been chosen for humanity's next experiment: the building of a floating, independent city in international waters (known as seasteading – there is interesting reading online about this).

There are four main characters: Evie (an oceanographer), Ina (an artist), Rafi (a storyteller and literature expert), and Todd (whose work leads to a major AI breakthrough). Each embodies a different response to the tension that arises between technology and nature.

The author wanted to be an oceanographer when he was young. He then worked as a computer programmer before becoming a writer, so he knows his themes well.

The writing around the ocean is stunningly beautiful, and the writing around the ever-growing influence of Al and social networks is very scary.



## Less is More: How Degrowth Will Save the World by Jason Hickel

I was very grateful to find this clear and hopeful book in times when it is all too easy to live with a sense of doom around ecological breakdowns, global inequality, etc.

Most people now realise, on some level, that the economy we are part of is destructive, unsustainable, and a driver of extreme inequalities.

We know the Earth cannot

endlessly support our growth-driven and extractive model of capitalism.

Yet we continue in this pursuit of growth, and in doing so, seemingly lose some ability to imagine anything different. Here is a book that gives back that ability to dream of an alternative and to visualise a realistic path to a more sustainable, fairer, and thriving future.

Jason Hickel, an economic anthropologist and leading voice in the degrowth movement, provides an intriguing history of capitalism—what it really is and where it has brought us—and makes a compelling case for degrowth.

He then offers multiple ideas and solutions for moving forward in a post-growth world. The title of the book doesn't really capture the breadth and depth of the insights and challenges contained in it.

And neither can this review; suffice it to say that it is one of the most important, eye opening, and commonsense books I have read.

Our coordinator leads this program alongside keeping in regular touch with participants.





We have also been continuing with our regular Saturday morning training runs. These are more informal than our regular Thursday 5km events. We usually meet by Java Hut and enjoy a coffee there afterwards.

The distance and meeting time, which varies each week, are posted on our Facebook page which is: Ruby Coast Running Club. Generally, we run anywhere from 10km up to around a half marathon distance (and very occasionally longer than that), and we start earlier in summer to avoid the heat.

2025 has been another busy year for Māpua Health Centre and we would like to say thank you to all our patients for your support during this time.

Fortunately, we now have a full complement of highly skilled and caring staff, including doctors, nurse practitioner, nurses, receptionists, administrators and supportive health practitioners. We will be having a registrar GP starting in the New Year.

This means that we are usually able to provide appointments at short notice and that patients can maintain consults with their own doctors in terms of continuity of care.

Our nurses also provide a range of services, including answering and making phone calls. There are charges for longer calls with our nurses as these can take up a considerable part of their nursing time.

We also have a Health Improvement Practitioner (HIP) working at Māpua Health on a Thursday. An appointment with Kamalesh Lovegrove is free and available to anyone of any age who would like support with:

- Managing stress
- Making healthy lifestyle changes
- · Learning strategies to improve your wellbeing

Please talk to one of our clinical team if you think this may be of assistance.

Over the holiday period we are open as usual except for the statutory holidays. If you require healthcare on the days that we are closed the team at Medical and Injury Centre will be open for urgent care. You can contact them directly on 5468881 or if you phone our practice during this time your call will be diverted directly to the Medical and Injury team (MIC).

Please consider that if you are taking regular medication this is a good time to think about stocking up so that you do not run out over the holiday period. Don't forget that enrolled patients can use the Well portal to request medications online. If you are unsure, please phone the health centre, 5402211.

You can also get your test results on Well or contact our staff if needed. However, we do not give results from tests that have been ordered outside the practice or from specialists. You will need to contact the specialist who ordered the test to get those results.

## Council's Development Bias

Dear Ratepayer

Congratulations on the rezoning of your property from rural residential to residential. This enables you to benefit from a substantial increase in the capital value of your property, for it allows you to subdivide your land into approximately 30 sections or to sell it to developers.

However, should you decide to stay, you will be rewarded with substantial rates increase in addition to noise, dust and other disturbances resultant of the development of other subdivisions around you as we have kindly rezoned the whole valley.

In reply to accusations that this development will destroy the village character of Māpua, we are very very sorry.

However, you will be able to apply for a rates remission as per our rates remission policy. Good luck with that because any decision will be solely at our, the Council's, behest and any remission will only be for 3 years anyway.

Yours sincerely

Tasman District Council's rates remission policy is a beautiful example of bureaucratic control. It starts with a series of reasonable conditions for ratepayers to qualify, such as being resident at the property and having owned it prior to the rezoning. However, the Council then gives itself total power:

"The Council may refuse to remit rates even where the conditions set out in this Policy are met by a ratepayer."

And then, even if it allows a remittance of rates, the Council puts on a time limit on its benevolence.

"The Council prefers to allow a transition period before affected ratepayers are required to pay the increased rates in full."

That "transition period" is four years, a time not in the policy, but one hidden from ratepayers, tucked up in the Council operating procedures:

"The remission (based on the policy) is applied for a maximum of 4 years after the rezoning takes place"

And just to add to the control, the amount of remission drops by 25% per year over those four years, being in money equivalent, just 2.5 years.

The result is that once your land is rezoned, no matter what, your rates are likely to go up very significantly within three years, reflecting the capital value increase. That will, in many circumstances, force ratepayers off their land. If that doesn't work, the Council can fall back on the undertaker to rescind its kindness. That's in the policy too.

"The remission of rates on a rating unit will cease upon the happening of any of the following events:

a) the death of the ratepayer..."

Subjective decisions made by bureaucracies such as councils, government departments, banks, in fact all large organisations, will always be subjected to all the biases of both the individual bureaucrats and the organisation's group think.

The very existence of this policy is an acknowledgement by the Council of the injustice and unfairness of its long-term planning and rezoning process. It is also an unspoken declaration that it is in bed with developers and that by comparison, ratepayers matter little.

This patsy and pathetic policy should focus on fairness and appropriate judicial process, not on what the bureaucracy wants. Policy setting is the duty of our Councillors, just like it is for all governors of organisations. Monitoring of policy implementation is also their duty.

That requires not just reading and accepting Council staff reports but verifying any such reports by seeking out what is actually happening on the ground, at the coal face, in this case the ratepayers affected by development.

As anyone who has been in governance knows, more often than not, management reports are filtered by the very biases that cause the bureaucratic injustices and what bureaucrat ever reports their mistakes?

Trust in our public institutions is dwindling rapidly, evidenced for the TDC in its own surveys. The fact that this policy's aforementioned four-year time criteria is hidden, like a lot of Council operating procedures, is yet another example of their flawed method of engendering public trust

Little wonder that there is a widespread belief among Māpua residents that the Council is only interested in development and that the rezoning of Māpua in plan change 81 is only to placate developers.

With our nation's economic downturn, high unemployment rate and mass migration to Aussie, the out-of-date population growth predictions put forward to justify the development are now on flaky ground.

#### Cristian definitely likes Mercedes Benz!

1978 200D, Germany: Diesel motor, was next and was used for driving country roads, but it was not a sports car.

1998 LSK 2300 Kompressor, Māpua: A local owner offered it to Cristian as it wasn't being driven much, and again he couldn't let the chance go by.

The car is a striking royal blue colour of the 2300 with its matching blue panels on seats & doors. The convertible roof folds down into the boot, which is magic to watch with the superb efficiency of a Mercedes. It has a clear screen between the two seat back rests, which lessens the blow-back air while travelling with the top down.

Front dome headlights and taillights, both typical of Mercedes styling of the 1990s. The instruments are not hidden by the steering wheel like many modern cars. Again, the royal blue colour, so Californian (i.e. bright, strong), a contrast with the usual black, white and silver we get in NZ. A smart looking sports car.

Driving, the car gave a quiet start, but accelerating along Ruby Bay you started to get a nice grizzle sound out the back and sometimes a wheeze of the turbo not quite open. I gun it up to 80km up the Bluff and there was no hesitation going up the hill.

Despite the wind noise from the convertible, you could still converse.

Maybe that glass partition between the seats works. Past Tasman and on to the by-pass I floored it. There was a slight delay before the turbo kicked in, but then we were motoring. Steering very positive, visibility good, you can see the perimeters of the car which is what you need to drive a car fast. Overall driving smooth, not lazy luxury smooth but sports car smooth.

I am a man used to those V8 engines and a lot of noise. Cristian's LSK 2300 (2.3litre) Kompressor (means supercharged in reference to the turbo) matched the noise & acceleration of some of the big engines. It might not be seen as a big muscle car but a great choice for a drive on a fine day with the top down.

From Cristian "I enjoy now summers, with the roof tucked away in the boot and the wind blowing freely, while driving our beautiful South Island roads".

Cristian talked a lot about an SL500 coupe — maybe that's next!

Our last gathering will be on 5th December, and the next one will be on January 30th, 2026, as our usual meeting day falls on Waitangi Day, so we have changed the date.




